# LUSITANIA IS

Crossed the Atlantic in Four Fred Tremayne Goes to Sleep on Police Department of New York Days, Nineteen Hours, Fifty-Two Minutes.

Takes Three Records-May Mean Passing of Recriprocating Engine And Installation of Turbines.

New York, Oct. 11.-All New York welcomed the record-breaking Lusitania as she swung into her dock today bearing the title of Queen of the Sens, wrested from her German rivals, Three hundred and twenty-three firemen under orders to work to their limit, fed the furnaces between 950 and 1,000 tons of picked British navy Welsh coal each day, in order that this result might be obtained. On Tuesday night the officers gave each fireman a bottle of ale in appreciation of their efforts. The next day, the Lusitania broke all records by reeling off 617 knots, and made an hourly record of 24.76 knots.

Four days, nineteen hours and fifty minutes out from Queenstown, with every transatlantic speed record in her possession, the Cunard iner Lasitania swept by Sandy Hook light ship at 1:17 a. m. today, after a pause off the bar to await daylight, steamed slowly up the harbor to receive the recognition of her right to the title of Queen of the Sea.

Three records were written down in her log-book, two of them wrested from the great German rival of the Cunard, and one from the swift Lucania, of her and one from the swift Lucania, of her own line. They were the shortest time from any European port to New York; the fastest average speed for any transatiantic voyage, 23.99 nautical miles per hour, and the longest daily run, 671 nautical miles. Translated into land miles, her speed average for the run was 27.60 miles an hour. Her achievement is a triumph for British shiphulding, and sailors, and may mark the passing of the old-fashioned reciprocating engine and the beginning of the universal installation of the turthe universal installation of the tur

"We are most anxious to get Lionetti," the sheriff of Sait Lake county wrote to the local police, "because the crime of which he is charged is a most aggravated one. We think he has gone to your city. Arrest him on sight and we will send an officer to Utica with the necessary extradition papers for the return of the prisoner."

CLEVER WORK.

The police obeyed instructions in a way that reflects credit on the department. A small photo of Lionetti upon a lady's pin and a brief description of the lady's pin and a brief description of the man wanted were the only clues upon which the police had to work. After a search of many hours. Sergts. Mc-Mahon and Corrou found Lionetti in a house on Elizabeth street and they placed him under arrest late last night. He told the officers that he landed in Utica Wednesday evening and he was greatly surprised that he had been found so quickly. For a time he denied that he was guilty of the crime found so quickly. Finally he admitted that he had gotten into trouble and in the most indifferent way possible he said he would go back to Salt Lake and settle the matter by marrying the girl. to the Record-Herald from Winnipeg, Man., says: "Tales of cannibalism and famine among the natives of northeastern Canada, Setween the eastern shore of James bay and Labrador, are brought back by J. A. Osborne, editor of the Fort Francis Times, who has just com-

pleted a reip of exploration in that While at Moose factory, the explorer met a young man who fied thither in terror of his uncle, who, he said, had killed and eaten eight human beings. There, too, he saw a woman who last winter killed and ate her two children, so great was the famine. This lack of

food primarily was brought about by the fact that the woods seemed almost entirely without the usual number of deer and rabbits, upon which animals the natives ordinarily exist.

These occurences did not seem to cause any stir in that region, and Osborne has come to the conclusion that camibalism is practised openly on many occasions among the Indian and many occasions among the Indians and half-breeds.

One village on Main river was wiped off the map because of the great snowfall last winter, Having no provisions stored up, and with streams covered solld with ice, the Indians starved to death, with the exception of a party of young men and women, who decided to try to make Hudson's Bay Fort, 150 miles down the streams. After a journey marked by untold privation, they reached the fort more dead than alive. A relief expedition sent back to the village found nething but 13 corpses in the rude huts which comprised the village.
