Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer readings at 6 a. m., 30.26 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 65 degrees; maximum, 89; minimum, 52; mean, 65, which is 1 degree below normal. Deficiency of daily mean temperature since July 1, 3.26 degrees. Precipitation since the first of the month, .4 inch, which is .36 inch below the normal. Deficiency in precipitation since Jan. 1, .1 inch.

Local forecast for Salt Lake City and vicinity: Partly cloudy, with light rain and cool. Generally fair tonight and Friday and cooler. (Forecast at Denver, Colo.) Generally fair tonight and Friday, except possibly showers in south portion Friday; cooler Friday.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the Gulf and lowest over the Pacific. Missouri Valley and extreme northwest, and lowest over the plateau region and southwest. Precipitation occurred over portions of Texas, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Illinois, Montana, Oregon, and the B. N. V. territories, with heavy rains in Missouri and Kansas. Thunderstorms were reported over portions of Texas, Kansas, and Montana.

The temperature changes were slight except a fall of 10 degrees to 12 degrees over portions of Missouri, Nebraska, South Dakota and Minnesota.

Governor B. B. Odell Jr. and Party Arrive From Yellowstone Park This Morning and Spend the Day in Sightseeing and Pleasure—Wall Street Scare and Empire State Politics.

Gov. B. B. Odell Jr., accompanied by his sons H. B. and Bryant, State Senators T. E. Ellsworth, Geo. Francis V. Greene, Dr. S. B. Ward and son and Frederick Clark, came in over the Oregon Short Line at 8:30 this morning. The gubernatorial party was met with carriages at the depot by Acting Gov. Hammond and Gen. C. S. Burton and taken to the Knutsford hotel.

Gov. Odell and his party left the narrow confines of the empire state to the Fourth of July for an extended western trip for the purpose of enjoying the glories of the west and to lay in a store of health, which, judging from appearances, they did, because all the members of the party looked braced, healthy and happy.

They came by way of the great lakes to Duluth and then went to St. Paul and over the Canadian Pacific to Puget sound and down the coast line to San Francisco.
