

Edward G. Lewis Said to Have Collected \$1.185.000 Through His Mail Order Bank,

HE ADVERTISED A SWINDLE.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 6 - Alleging that Edward G. Lewis had fraudulently collected \$1,185,000 through the operation of his mull-order bank, the defunct People's United States bank, of University City, and that he had loaned himself or his concerns \$844,000 of that money, the government today began the presentation of one of its cases against the former banker in the United States district court. ikifore Judge John E. "We shall show to you that Lewis devised and put into effect a mail-order scheme advortised in his Woman's Magazine and Woman's Journal, inducoments to get people to subscribe stock and make deposits, and we shall show that he did not carry out thes. inducements. These publications containing the advertisements and various additional literature and circulars. all with the intention of inducing people to invest in his scheme, went through the United States mail. Lewis in advertisements at the time said that his publications reached 2,200,000 fami-
