A GRAPHIC STORY.

The most graphic story of the accident was told by J. Pauls of 66 Twentysecond place, who stood across the street when the building went up. "The first thing I knew," he said, "I was blown against a telegraph pole I was facing the market and it seemed that the whole building rose up in the air at once and then collapsed into the cellar a heap of ruins. I ran across the street, and as I crossed the car tracks I could hear the cries of the people imprisoned in the wreckage, Almost immediately the flames burst out all over the place, and it seemed that

everything was on fire at once. "Then I caught sight of a man crawling out from the basement. He did not seem to be badly hurt and called for help. I recognized him as the sausage maker Trostal had hired a few days before. I do not know what his name is. A man who ran up jumped down to help him, and between us we gto him to the street. He was able to walk and went away at once. "The first explosion in the building disconnected the gas mains and they caught fire at once. The fire seemed to follow the pipes and five minutes

later the manhole west in Archer ave-nue blew up with a report almost as loud as the first. The manhole to the east followed in a few minutes, "We could hear the cries in the basement growing fainter and we had to al-
