COUNTY TAX VALUATIONS.

Special School Election to Determine Proposition to Consolidate Districts.

Petitions Against Liquor Selling in Canyon Turned Down-Huntsville Wants City Government.

At the meeting of the board of county commissioners Chairman Joseph Stanford submitted a lengthy report on the proposition before the board to consolidate or group certain school districts in the county so as to more equally divide the proceeds from corporate taxation between the districts proposed for the consolidating. Commissioner Stanford reported recommending that the commissioners take the entire responsibility on themselves to consolidates the districts, but suggested that a special school election be held on May 22, at which time the voters in the various districts might have an opportunity of voting on the proposition and there-by give the commissioners a better knowledge of the desires of the resi-dents of those districts, but that the commissioners reserve the right to pass on the proposition after the election. on the proposition after the election. The report was unanimously adopted by the board and the election will take place the 22nd of this month. The chairman of each board of trustees in each district is named as judges of election and they will announce the building at each place where the voting will take place.

will take place. The following precincts will vote at Kanesville: Hooper, Roy and Kanes-ville; at Garland: Wilson, Taylor, West Weber and Garland and these seven districts will vote on the proposition for their consolidation into one district. The following precincts will vote at
