

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—To-night our theatre goes may have the pleasure of witnessing one of Madame Scheller's most artistic performances—Pauline in the Lady of Lyons. As Thursday night will be the last opportunity, at least for the present, of seeing this talented lady, the Theatre ought certainly to be crowded on both occasions.

MAIL DEPARTURE.—A. W. Street, Esq., politely requests us to correct an error made by Wells, Fargo & Co. in relation to the time of departure of the Eastern mail. The time of its departure is 5.30 p.m., and not 9.30 as previously reported. Mr. Street also informs us that the eastern and western mails close an hour before their departure; other mails half an hour.

IRREGULAR.—We have heard several complaints of the uncertainty with which letters are carried between this city and Echo Canyon. One gentleman remarked in our hearing that he sent a letter out on Saturday, that the person to whom he had sent it had not received it on Monday morning; he added that he would not for \$50 have had it fail to reach him by that time. A letter dated at the head of Echo on the 19th reached here this morning.

A TERRIFIC SNEEZE.—We have heard it said, of one of our colored citizens residing here, that he possesses the faculty of sneezing when it rains (the same side sneeze, no sham about it), and of keeping it on as long as he likes, in fact, a regular "snorter" at it. But the Territorial Enterprise, published at Nevada City, tells of one Michael Kelly, residing in that city, who on the 22nd instant had such a powerful sneeze that he actually sneezed his shoulder out of joint and did it so easily that he did not know how it was done. It required a surgeon and a good deal of pulling from four men to pull it in again. Such sneezing as that is no joke, and such sneezers as Michael Kelly and our colored friend here are not to be sneezed at.

DISTINGUISHED VISITORS AT DENVER.—The Rocky Mountain News of the 21st instant tells of the arrival that day of Generals Grant, Sherman and Sheridan, and Brigadier General Deane. No public reception was given nor no parade or ceremony observed, as it was understood that they were traveling in a private capacity. They were to start on the following morning for a day's trip into the mountains, would return to Denver the day after and on the 24th start east for Cheyenne. The News adds that Denver was never before visited by such a distinguished party, whether viewed in the light of their past achievements, or of the position they occupy in the army and before the country.

ANOTHER RAILROAD PROJECT.—Dr. Carver in a letter to the Omaha Herald recently, proposes an air-line route between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans with a track eight or ten feet wide, and the cars to be traveling hotels capable of accommodating four or five hundred passengers with all the comforts that can be obtained in any hotel in this or any other country. The Doctor says that in New Jersey a model car, with each wheel running independently like a wheelbarrow, with a small engine about as large as a barrel in the bow of the car has been run at the rate of over two miles a minute with the utmost ease and safety, and he is pretty confident that the journey between New York and San Francisco will be performed in forty-eight hours. The Doctor may be called enthusiastic by some, but it is very likely that a far greater speed than that will yet be attained.

MISS ANNETTE INCK.—The lovers of the drama will be pleased to learn that this talented artist, engaged by the Lessees of our theatre, arrived in this city on Saturday evening, and will shortly make her bow to a Salt Lake audience. Miss Inck is well known on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, and more particularly the latter, where she has played several engagements. Those who have witnessed her artistic personations speak in the highest terms of her abilities.

EXPERIMENT.—The Territorial Enterprise says that on the 21st inst., the tracklayers on the U. P. R. put down the ties and rails, drove the spikes and perfectly completed a little over a quarter of a mile of track in fifteen minutes. It has been claimed that with the use of the newly invented tracklayer great things have been accomplished in tracklaying; but it is doubtful whether it could do more than that. It is gratifying to know that there are some things in this world in which machinery cannot excel human hands.

CALLER.—H. H. Bigelow, Esq., of San Francisco, made us a call yesterday. He is representing the interests of the Pacific Insurance Company, for whom Messrs. Walker, Brown & Co. are agents, and bears letters of introduction to some of our prominent citizens. He expressed himself much pleased with our beautiful city, though only some ten days out from San Francisco. We hope he may find his stay as pleasant as he found the city agreeable to the eye.

COMPLIMENTARY.—The Omaha Herald of the 22d says: "We yesterday visited the second batch of Mormons. They number 755, 170 of whom are from Denmark, the remainder being from England and Ireland. They are being very properly housed about their present place of detention or imprisonment, in fact they were a little late in getting here. They left Salt Lake City on the evening train."

MORMON EMIGRANTS.—This morning at nine o'clock a special train of six passenger coaches and eleven box cars, with seven hundred or eight hundred Mormon emigrants arrived here from the east. Four of the box cars carried a portion of the emigrants, their baggage occupying the remaining seven cars of that class. These emigrants are principally Scandinavian and British.—Cheyenne Leader.

MALAD CITY.—Elder Edwin M. Curtis, who left Malad City on the 22nd instant, informs us that at that date the wheat crop in that locality promised a fair average yield. The oats and barley had been almost entirely destroyed by the grasshoppers. The potatoes, peas, cabbages, and gar canes, and cabbages on the bench lands had been mostly destroyed by the ravages of large black crickets which had been very numerous. The health of the settlers, generally, was good, and with the exception of the above drawbacks they were progressing in temporal matters pretty fairly. A good grain mill is in course of erection by Elder John Nelson, of Logan, and is expected to be ready for work by October. Elder Henry Peck has a good mill now in operation. They have a day and Sunday school, which are pretty well attended. An infirmarian had been appointed on the 22nd instant under the direction of Bro. R. G. Evans. Water has been turned into the canal this year under better conditions, which has consequently lessened the necessity for irrigation. The settlement seems to be progressing, and among them under the guidance of Bishop Daniel Daniels, harmony and good feelings are everywhere manifest.
