EVERYBODY seems pretty well satisfied that Grant has been re-elected President by a large majority. This is the highest political honor that he could receive at the hands of his fellow-countrymen, though for the matter of that it is to be feared that the sentiment of honor has very little to do with the votes of thousands of his adherents. However, we congratulate him upon the result, for notwithstanding the very presumable drawback of many voting for him purely out of official or pecuniary considerations, he cannot but consider that thousands did otherwise, giving him their vote from the high consideration in which they held him, first because of his decisive successes in the war, and next because they did not recognize any other presidential candidate who would suit them so well.

There is one thing in favor of Grant—he is not a highly person, nor given to flying off at crochety tangents. His has a close-textured, solid brain, nothing soft about it apparently. His greatest danger is in one quality—which in some respects is one of his best—his extraordinary firmness. As is the case with much Scotch extract, when he is set it is of no use trying to turn him. This is an excellent characteristic when the person who has it is in the right direction, but when otherwise it is one of the most dangerous, and mischief cannot fail to ensue. A great amount of firmness requires a great amount of thoughtfulness and candor, otherwise perhaps it is not a very desirable quality, as it is liable to degenerate into unreasoning animal stubbornness, and is not at all unlikely to work more harm than good.

Of course, like other candidates in a similar situation, President Grant has been charged with operating executive with a view to his re-election. Whether this is true or not, does not specially concern us, and we have nothing to say about it. He is but a man with human imperfections. But whatever may have been the case in this regard, now that his re-election is evidently assured, unless he, unlike most other re-elected Presidents, looks to a possible third term, there can be little inducement, in official appointments and removals, to regard the desires of scheming and unscrupulous politicians. The civil service, it is strongly urged, requires reform. No doubt this is the case, and in the discharge of his high official duties, President Grant will have a magnificent opportunity, the ensuing four years, to reconstitute the service, and earn for himself the profound respect of that large and substantial class of citizens who think more of the material and social welfare of the country than of the politician's idea of clutching the spoils and of self-appropriating the largest possible portion of the aggregated taxes.

In all appointments to office, the controlling idea should be fitness for the office, this fitness to embrace integrity and ability. To the appointment of military persons to office, especially when they have done the country good service, if they are fit persons, nobody can reasonably object. But fitness should overrule all considerations of favor. If a military candidate, no matter what the value of his services rendered or expected, is an unfit person for office, he should not be appointed. If such a person deserves consideration, it should be rendered him in a way that will not prejudice the public interests. Many a brave and valiant fighter would make a miserable civil officer. If President Grant will turn his characteristic firmness in this direction, he will do the country most excellent service, and leave a name worthy of emulation. This same rule of action will apply with equal force and with equally satisfactory results to politicians and their friends who hunger for official pickings and stealings.

There should be a clean sweep of the blatant demagogues, like some we have around here, who would be far more at home venting their "barbaric yaps" in a spot where their besotted companions, than in competing situations of grave public responsibility. One cannot be many minutes in the company of some of our local Federal officials without being painfully struck with the coarse, low, brutal instincts which they manifest, as if unscrupulous intrigue, sordid expletives, and demagogic invective constituted the principal part of their official duties.

We should like to see here, so long as Utah must continue a Territory, a full corps of Federal officials of high tone (not loud tone), liberal sentiments, and gentlemanly instincts, who, caring nothing for the mere politicians, but who would discharge their responsibilities with probity and impartiality, and to the best of their ability, in accordance with the true intent thereof, the spirit of liberty, and the genius of American government, alike regardless of "Mormon" or "Gentile," or any sectional, religious, political or partisan issues.

As the Chief Executive of the nation, we must look to President Grant for decisive movements in this direction, for the appointment to office of men of integrity and capability, and the immediate removal of such as disregard the law, and manifest more affection for matters outside of their office than for the faithful discharge of their proper duties.

DETROIT, Nov. 5.—Seventy-five small towns and villages in this State give Grant eight thousand majority. No titles heard from. O. S.—The city gives Grant 1,000 majority, which will be increased to 2,500 in the county. PHILADELPHIA.—Grant's majority in the city, except in the 25th ward, is 1,250. He carried every ward in the city. OKLAHOMA.—The interest in this State has centered almost wholly on the Presidential election and Sunday liquor

law. Everything else has given way to these two questions, and in places where there is a large German population the anti-Sunday law influence has gone to the advantage of the Democratic ticket. This makes the contest between Oglesby and Koerber, for governor, very close. The contest of the legislature may be determined also by the same question. Very few returns on Congressmen have been received, and the State has been re-divided, no opinion can be formed from such returns as have been received for President. The probability is that the Republicans will elect two out of three in this country, namely, Farwell and Rice. Possibly Hawdon, Democrat, beats Ward in the 2nd district. Harburt, Republican, is elected in the 4th district; also Marshall, Democrat, in the 5th. Knapp and Knapp in the 11th district, Hawley in the 6th and Burchard in the 5th. The members of the present Congress are elected. McNutt in the 13th Congress district. Times are so quiet in all affairs, and of these the Republicans will certainly elect twelve.

MILWAUKEE.—One hundred and eighty towns outside of Milwaukee give Grant 1,000 majority. The Republicans of the State Central Committee claim the State for Grant.

ST. PAUL, Minn.—The Republicans of the State Central Committee claim the State for Grant.

MOBILE, Ala.—Special to the State Register indicates Grant majority in Iowa at between 55,000 and 60,000.

CHARLOTTE, N. C.—Returns from various portions of South Carolina indicate that Grant has carried the State by a heavy majority. Twelve of the Republican precincts of Charlotte give Grant 1,500 majority.

BOSTON.—Boston gives Grant a majority of 5,434, against 4,031 in 1868. One hundred and sixty-nine towns give Grant 68,798 and Greeley 32,123.

AUGUSTA, Ga.—The indications are that the Greeley majority will be about 30,000.

NEW YORK.—Eleven Liberal and ten Republican precincts are elected to the Assembly from this city. Greeley's majority in Brooklyn is 5,790.

LOUISVILLE, Ky.—The election passed off without a return, and is scattered, but indicates a very light vote. The city gives Greeley about 15,000 majority, and Standford, Democrat, for Congress about 4,000.

NEW ORLEANS.—Thirty-five towns and stations in Mississippi show a net majority of 4,839 for Grant. Only eleven of these towns give a majority for Greeley.

NEW ORLEANS.—All dispatches from Texas report the election quiet.

WHEELING, Va.—Indications are strong that West Virginia will go for Grant.

DETROIT, Mich.—Partial returns from the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 5th wards of Detroit indicate nearly a thousand majority for Grant.

EVANSVILLE, Ind.—Grant's majority in this city is 484.

ST. LOUIS.—Sixteen city precincts give Grant 7,503; Greeley 9,718, O'Connor 187.

CLEVELAND.—Estimated Republican majority, 3,800.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind.—The Republican central committee claim a majority in the city of 10,000 to 15,000. Democratic central committee concede the state by 5,000.

Cleveland has recently enlarged its boundaries by annexing the village of East Cleveland, covering an area of six miles of territory, including a large public park, and containing six thousand inhabitants. By this acquisition Cleveland's total population is increased to about 122,000, and its taxable property to \$75,000,000.

Commissioner Walker denies the truth of the reports that there is to be any change in the Indian policy of the administration. He says as a matter of fact the original policy was never carried out. The Commissioner has a simple feature: First, to protect all those Indians who remained on their reservations and faithfully observed their obligations to the government; and second, to punish the others who left their reservations and preyed upon the property of the whites. The first part of the policy has been pretty effectually worked, but the second has not. With regard to the latter feature it is now proposed to work as follows: There are several tribes of Indians who have thus far proved intractable, notwithstanding all kindly advances. Towards these a winter campaign will be conducted, if there are any depredations to justify it. —Colorado Citizen.

Lord Penance, Judge of the English Court of Probate, has resigned.

The office of Master of the Mint in England was lately abolished, or rather, to save the separate salary, merged in that of the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

The rise of one half-penny in the price of the four-penny loaf, which has taken place in London, is attributed to the increased wages paid to bakers under the new scale. Another rise is expected.

On the continent at present, within the empire, a mode of cooking of four or six milk-white donkeys, matching exactly in size, that color being the favorite. These animals are worth almost their weight in gold.

The emigration from Germany to the United States increases daily. Thousands of emigrants, including not only farm hands, skilled laborers and tradesmen, but people of a wealthier class, are constantly arriving at Hamburg to take the steamers for New York.

A challenge is published in the London Sporting Times, issued by J. Rooke, one of the owners of the English trotter Sial Gray, to trot his horse against any other horse or mare in the world three heats, two out of three, for £100 or £200 a side. Race to come off at the Royal Oak Park trotting track, Manchester.

The London Milk Journal says—In England, the system of associated dairies steadily gaining ground, and butter factories on this principle are being opened. The quality also of the butter is steadily improving, and bids fair to rival that produced in Holstein and Mecklenburg, which are now sent first in that market.

A large manufactory of railway carriage springs, established at Kralinger, near Rotterdam, by a large Sheffield house, has just been inaugurated, and other English manufactory intend to establish similar works in Holland. The latter of course is attributed to the strikes in England, the result of which is to drive capital from this country to seek investment on foreign soil.

Prof. Voelcker says in the Mark Lane Express, that by far the largest proportion of the fertilizing substances contained in the turnip crop, probably about seven-eighths, is returned to the soil if the crop is consumed by the sheep on the field, and only about one-eighth of the materials useful as manure is carried away by the sheep in the form of bone, and the nitrogenous matter which enters into the composition of the animal organism.

The discovery of coal beneath the Permian foundation in the neighborhood of Birmingham is likely to be followed by a similar discovery in the western portion of Lancashire. Mr. Edward Young, of Doughtybridge, who has surveyed and explored the district, is of opinion that there is a coal field of between 400 and 500 square miles, commencing near Bolton, and extending to Liverpool on the one side and Lancaster on the other.

A writer in the John Bull suggests that convicted criminals be employed in the cultivation of opium, and that they be kept in prison. He shows that the papers in the workhouse are small worse than felons in the prisons. The tender mercies of State charities always have been and will continue to be exhausted upon those who have outlived themselves by crime. We shall find in no safety to society but in God's plan of punishing the wicked.

According to the London Morning Advertiser, a new sect has made its appearance in London called the "Howling Repentants," whose practice is to stand up at all public meetings, and "Howl" at all convicts present during the day, and at two periods during the night. At present they set out recognized places of worship, but conduct their services in the open air. This is a sect which is sure to prosper, because at howling time, anywhere they are sure to have the field to themselves.

A correspondent of the Delhi Gazette at Kumaon says: There is a perfect reign of terror in these parts at present on account of the depredations of a family of tigers that seem to be slaying men and women indiscriminately. It is said that these pests have been boldened to commit such havoc by the villagers at this season picking their cattle out in the open.

The London Standard thinks that the peace of Europe rests upon a very questionable footing. There is not a corner of the continent which is not armed to the teeth. M. Thiers openly boasts that he possesses an invincible army, and all the elements of Franco-Russia, Orientalism, Legitimism and Imperialism are united on the necessity of obtaining revenge from Germany as soon as practicable. Neither Prince Bismarck nor Count Andrassy, the Austrian Premier, believe in peace. M. Thiers continues, at Berlin was due to a desire on the part of the high contracting powers interested to come to an understanding with the subject of Germany, and claims that she can put 300,000 men in the field, and while Italy is fortifying Monte Mario, on the Italian side of the Mostet, Germany is preparing against the French military preparations at Modane on the French side of the Alps, Spain is urging a demand upon England for the possession of Gibraltar, Italy is making a complete revolution, also, in the question of the Pope and Prussia, introducing into the troubled arena of European politics religious dimensions.
