RESOURCES OF THE COUNTRY—EFFECT OF PERSECUTION.

A few words from the Gila Valley may be of interest to many in the north who are inclined to go south, and like to learn the

FACILITIES OF THIS COUNTRY.

To such I will say, this is a goodly land, and I do not know any one living here who wants to return to Utah for a home. Of course we have no fine houses and lawns—it requires time as well as money to create them; and many of our settlers live in very poor habitations, such as dirt-roofed cabins, tents, etc., but all are consoled by the hope of something better by and by.

Fruit trees, grapes, etc., do extremely well. Young peach trees here in Pima not four feet high are loaded with peaches, and were set out last year. Fig trees look flourishing also. Besides the cottonwood are found ash, locust, mulberry, hackberry and oak growing upon the benches and along the foot of the mountains, with pine, cedar, juniper and sycamore higher up. Farmers are now busy

CUTTING THE FIRST CROP

of lucern, which does very well here. Wheat is headed out and barley is excellent; also melons, corn and other farm products. Both common and sweet potatoes look well. Common potatoes sell here at five cents per lb. —nicer for the seller than the buyer.

TWO CROPS OF POTATOES

are raised, planting in February or March for the first, and in June or July for the second crop, as the first crop does not keep well. June or July is also the time for planting corn, squashes, etc.

Last week a regular "norther" prevailed for a day, and was so cold as to injure wheat and vegetables in the low lands along the river, being followed by frost at night. It was a new experience for the settlers here, though as I understand, frost is liable to fall in April.

Many are busy cutting grass for hay upon the bench lands, for sale at Fort Thomas and Fort Grant, and in fact, have been haying all the past winter. Wild hay is worth from \$12 to \$15 per ton.

The general health is good, and I believe this is as healthy a climate as any I have seen. But all is not peace.

BIGOTRY AND PERSECUTION

are rife here, and are having their usual effect—that of spreading our colonies more widely, and cementing more closely the bonds of union among the Saints. The efforts made by our opponents are simply producing the same results that persecution has done in all ages—increasing the faith, diligence, unity and power of the Saints.

Stormy seas make good sailors; and the difficulties we meet and conquer bring out the self-reliance and powers of the individual, and especially faith and reliance upon our Father in heaven. It seems strange that men of intelligence and education, well versed in the history of the past, cannot see that their course of oppression is sure to produce results the opposite of what they desire and expect, but oppressors and tyrants in all ages have always been blind in this respect.

O. L. HANSEN ACQUITTED.

THE TESTIMONY CONFLICTING.

Yesterday afternoon the examination of Mrs. Christina Valentine, for the prosecution was continued. She testified that Hansen told her he followed her through the rooms in the Endowment House; she went to live at his house about a year after this; she went to work.

Cross-examined by Judge Bennett.—Was at Hansen's two or three days at time, and did general housework; she did the same class of work in the city; that was how she obtained her living; she had never been married to the defendant, or lived with him as his wife; she lived in her son's house; a man named Anderson lived there too; she was in a room by herself; she had had trouble with the Andersons; defendant had visited her house several times; he had never occupied her bed; she left the house because of trouble with the Anderson's, and went to Hansen's because she was acquainted and got work.

Re-direct by the District Attorney.—Witness was sometimes hired to work at defendant's, and was paid in milk and butter, which she used; Hansen had stayed at the house to protect her, and had slept in his wagon or the stable; she had not stayed at the house since, but came to the city; Hansen had been at her house.

John Andersen had lived in Christina Valentine's house; had seen defendant there; he had stopped there three times; had seen him in Mrs. Valentine's room, sitting and talking; had also seen him in her bed; had once heard Mrs. Valentine say to Hansen, "Come, let us go to bed;" defendant had denied being married to Mrs. Valentine.

Cross-examined by Judge Bennett.—Witness had no trouble with Mrs.

Valentine, except about some chickens; had never abused her; when defendant told witness, he was not married, witness had felt offended, and would never get over it; saw defendant in bed; Mrs. Valentine was in the kitchen at the time.

Ludovic Hansen testified that he was defendant's wife's nephew, and had lived at the house; had seen Mrs. Valentine there; she slept upstairs; defendant occupied the room downstairs with his wife, never with Mrs. Valentine; had never heard of any relations between her and defendant outside of court; Mrs. Valentine was now living about a mile and a half from defendant's, in a house rented by him; witness and defendant were working at the house, and he had left him there in the evening and found him there in the morning; this was within the last five weeks.

David Duncomb had seen Mrs. Valentine at defendant's house several times; had never been spoken to of any relationship between them; had seen defendant going to and from the house where Mrs. Valentine now lived, during the past few weeks.

District Attorney Dickson stated that the testimony of the prosecution was all in, and from that it appeared the strongest evidence of cohabitation was subsequent to the date of the indictment. There had been no proof of the relationship of marriage, and he thought the evidence insufficient to warrant a conviction, and asked that by the Court should so instruct the jury.

The Court charged the jury that the testimony was insufficient, and they could render a verdict without leaving their box.

At this instruction from the judge, a look of disappointment overspread the countenances of the jury, who appeared chagrined at being deprived of the privilege of conviction, but after a short pause a verdict of "not guilty," was given, and the defendant was discharged.
