LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Sunday Services.—The Sabbath services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will consist of the following: Sunday schools in the several wards at 10 a. m.; general meeting in the Tabernacle at 2 p. m.; and evening meetings in the wards as usual.

Home missionaries are appointed to visit the country wards during the day.

From the North.—Apostle Chas. F. Rich came down from Bear Lake, to spend a few days in the Metropolis. He reports very cold weather and backward crops in the region from which he comes.

Quick Trip.—The local editor of the *Herald* paid Ogden a brief visit on Thursday evening, and returned next day, looking much refreshed by his brief respite from literary toil. Welcome home.

Re-occupation of Bridger.—A recent number of the *Cheyenne Leader* published the military order for the re-occupation of Fort Bridger. Companies "E," "H," "K" and "I" of the Fourteenth Infantry are to be stationed there.

From the South.—Mr. C. R. Savage, our photographic friend, returned last evening from a week's trip to Sanpete Valley. He obtained some fine views along the route of the new narrow-gauge railroad through Salt Creek Canyon. He states that the grading is going ahead nicely, and by the 4th of July will be completed to the Wales coal beds. The railroad from Nephi to that point is 39 miles in length.

Z. M. S.—The members of Zion's Musical Society, including the organist and brass band departments, have been invited by Vice-President D. O. Calder, to join in an excursion to Spring Lake Pleasure grounds, (Calder's Farm), on Tuesday next. Water.—The attention of the watermaster is respectfully called to the fact that for the last week or two, on North Temple Street, between First and Second West, the water has been overflowing the entire sidewalk and a portion of the street, making it very inconvenient for pedestrians in that locality. Also to the overflow of water from the cross ditches into hollows at the intersection of Third East and Fifth South Streets, spilling the road and muddying up every vehicle that passes.

Her Majesty's Yacht.—The new yacht "Pinarof" surmised the "Hardly Ever," since its recent successful trip to the mud flats at the mouth of the Jordan, experienced its second cruise to-day, from Lake Shore, where it has been at anchor since its first noted voyage described some time ago in these columns. The gallant crew have nearly recovered from their last attack of "enjoyment," and though a strong odor of ammonia still pervades the atmosphere in their immediate vicinity, this morning they felt contented at least a repetition of their former success in bulleting the beautiful lake.

Assault with a Knife.—A man named Joseph Arnold, was arrested, yesterday afternoon, for assaulting another named Ed. Pitts, with a pocket knife. The two were engaged as workmen, excavating a cellar just below the Washach Building, when an altercation took place over some money which Arnold claims the other owed to him. It resulted in the assault mentioned, Arnold being the aggressor. Pitts alleges that Arnold was drunk at the time, but the officers who made the arrest state differently. The examination is going on this afternoon. No blood was spilt, we believe.

The Drama.—We understand that Mr. P. Margrett is endeavoring to secure some of the best dramatic talent in the Territory, to assist him in the production of two pieces at the Salt Lake Theatre on the evening of Monday, June 21st. Should his efforts to cater for the amusement of the public meet with the patronage it deserves, and satisfactory arrangements can be made with the management, a performance will be given at least once a week on from that date.

Watchman Notes.—From the Beaver Watchman of the 9th inst: The town of Milford has three lumber yards, two supplied from Beaver and one by the railroad. Price of lumber \$35 to \$50 per M. The Plute mine in ME. daily strikes the finest ore ever discovered in Utah, consisting of a streak of horn silver and gold about a foot in thickness. It is beautiful to gaze upon.

The County Court was in session yesterday and appointed a commission to examine the Beaver River at Milford with a view of putting in a bridge at that point and to report on the feasibility of building a road through the Pass.

Box Elder Ladies Conference.—The quarterly conference of the Relief societies, young ladies' and primary associations of Box Elder Stake, was held in Bingham City on Tuesday and Wednesday. The meetings both days were well attended, and the proceedings of a very interesting character. The first day was principally devoted to Relief Society business, which being dispatched, the assembly was addressed by Apostle Lorenzo Snow, President Joseph Young, son, Sisters E. R. Snow, E. B. Wells and others. Sister Harriet Snow presided over this meeting. In the evening, an enjoyable entertainment was given by the Y. L. M. I. A., to raise funds for a library. The next day the young ladies held their quarterly meeting which was presided over by Sister Minnie Snow, and the excellent spirit that prevailed and the intelligent way in which the young ladies advanced their thoughts and discussed upon various principles, was as surprising to our Salt Lake friends who were present as visitors, as it was delightful to contemplate. In the afternoon of Wednesday, at 5 o'clock, a very interesting meeting of the Primary Associations was held, which closed the labors of the conference.

A Lesson in Caution.—A "young and happy couple" living in the Twelfth Ward were highly amused (?) the other evening on returning home from a visit to a friend's house some distance away, to find that their domicile had been entered by burglars in their absence, and all their silverware and jewelry stolen and the furniture turned topsyturvy all over the house. Examination proved that the villains must have entered by the back window, as it was the only one left unfastened, and all the others, as well as the doors, were barred securely. While the wife was bewailing her misfortune, and criminal neglect in not fastening the window where the robbers had gained access, the young husband peered into the wardrobe to see if his speckled pants were also missing, when lo and behold! there was the missing pair and precious stones nicely stowed away under some articles of clothing.
