Cleveland, March 7 .-- Nine witnesses were examined in the Chadwick trial today, and the defense established the fact that the claim of the government that Mrs. Chadwick had no money in the Oberlin bank at the time of drawing checks which were certified by Spear and Beckwith was incorrect in two instances at least.

It was shown by the general journal of the bank that on Nov. 3, 1903, when Mrs. Chadwick received a certified check for \$19,000 an entry crediting her with that amount was made on the journal of the bank and a deposit slip for \$10,000 was made out in her name. The entry and the slip were in the handwriting of Cashler Spear. Another entry of a similar nature, amounting to \$5,000, was also found. SAN DOMINGO TREATY TO BE REPORTED IMMEDIATELY

Washington, March 7,-Without de-termining any question of policy in re-gard to the Santo Domingo treaty, the gard to the Santo Domingo treaty, the senate decided today that the treaty should be reported as soon as possible from the committee on foreign relations, and the entire question fought out in executive session. This was the sentiment of the foreign relations committee, as well as the entire senate, and in two sessions of the committee the proceedings were with a view to the proceedings were with a view to reporting the treaty tomorrow if pos-sible.

The amendments offered in the committee were confined to a reduction of an alleged surplusage of words. They were offered verbally and taken down by a stenographer. They are to be printed and considered when the committee meets tomorrow. By a tacit understanding the policy involved in the treaty was not taken up by the committee, and it was understood that the action in submitting amendments in this manner did not commit any in this manner did not commit any senator to support the treaty. The pro-gram was merely to facilitate action and remove all chance of its being made a party question in the commit-

tee.

The prompt action of the foreign relations committee undoubtedly will result in a much earlier decision in the senate. Nearly every senator who discussed the treaty today expressed a desire that the measure be kept from becoming a party question.

To prevent this Senator Bacon offered to withdray his resolution concerning.

to withdraw his resolution concerning the protocol of an agreement entered into between the United States in Janinto between the United States in January, 1993, in reference to the Santo Domingo Improvement company's claim and modify it. When he again offers it the resolution will be general in character and ask that the foreign relations committee inquire and report whether the executive had the authority to make an agreement by which the United States takes charge of the customs of another country.

ed to the Bacon resolution, there was an incidental exchange of views among the senators concerning the treaty and the effect of the intervention of the Dominican government, including the right of the United States to collect debts due to American citizens. Japanese Fishermen Released.



The United States government has permitted the Carlisle to remain in Manila harbor until necessary repairs to her machinery have been effected.


