

## JAPANESE CAPTURE FIFTY CANNONS.

Russians Left Four Hundred Dead In the Kin Chou-San Shan Fight.

## JAPS LOST THREE THOUSAND

Gen. Kuropatkin Surprised at the Deliberation and Precision of the Enemy's Campaign.

Tokio, May 28 (noon).—The Russians have abandoned Nan Quan Ling and have been driven from Sanchilpu re-creating towards Port Arthur. The Japanese have captured 50 cannons. The Russians left 400 dead in the Kin Chou-San Shan fight. On the Japanese side the killed and wounded number 3,000.

## JAPS ACTING DELIBERATELY.

Newchwang, May 28 (morning).—A staff officer just from Mukden says the deliberation and precision of the enemy has surprised Gen. Kuropatkin, who at first believed the Japanese campaign would be one of rushing recklessness, with more theatrical display about the maneuvers than strategy. A Chinese merchant just arrived, who left Dalian five days ago, says the Russians have vacated the town, which, at the time of his departure, had not been occupied by the Japanese forces. The latter were still engaged in landing troops at Kin Chou Shan. It is said upon excellent authority that the Japanese plan to use force of 100,000 men in their operations against Port Arthur and take it by storm in a fortnight. They realize that their losses in the execution of this plan will be severe, but it is considered better to risk that than to keep a large army idle for three months. They do not propose, it is further said, to penetrate into the interior of the country any further than Mukden. The Russian authorities have secured 2,000,000 pounds in cash by French steamer.

## RUSIANS IN EASTERN KOREA.

Tokio, May 28 (10 a. m.).—The Japanese are not seriously disturbed by the Russian operations in eastern Korea. The movements of the Cossack cavalry and battery of guns that accompanies them is being closely watched by the Japanese, who are confident in their ability to protect their communications and maintain the military supremacy of Japan in Korea. The Yalu victory, which opened the Yalu estuary to water communication diminishes the importance of the line of land communications from Chinnampo to Wiju. The loss of their naval power compels the Russians to avoid the sea along the eastern coast of Korea and limits their operations to the land, where transportation difficulties prevent the concentration and operation of a large land force.

## CONTRABAND CHINAMEN.

Carload Arrives in San Francisco To Be Deported.

San Francisco, May 28.—A deputy U. S. marshal has arrived here from New York with a carload of 70 Chinamen ordered to be deported by the eastern courts. They will be sent to China on the Doric, leaving next Wednesday. The marshal has eight guards with him.

## NEGRO ASSAULTS GIRLS.

New York Police Had to Threaten to Shoot to Save Him.

New York, May 28.—A serious demonstration against Charles Green, a negro, who attacked two girls in Central Park has been checked by several policemen only after threats had been made by the latter to use their revolvers. The mob consisted of 300 or 400 men who aided in running down the negro in Fifty-ninth street. When they learned the charge against him stones and clubs were hurled at his

head but he was not seriously hurt. Threats of lynching then broke out and the crowd began to close in upon the negro, who managed to drag his

prisoner to the station after threatening to shoot.

The negro attacked the girls who were sisters while they were taking photographs in a much frequented section of the park. In endeavoring to drive him off one of the sisters beat him over the head with a camera and her scream quickly brought aid.

The negro took to his heels and when he reached Fifty-ninth street the crowd had grown to a howling mob. Several policemen ran up and headed the chase. Green was soon overhauled and when the crowd began to cry "lynch him" he covered behind the police in terror. He was identified immediately by the sisters, both of whom suffered severely from shock but were not injured otherwise.

DIED FROM POISONING.

Three Members of Jose Tafaya Family Buried in One Grave.

Las Vegas, N. M., May 27.—Jose Tafaya and two other members of his family, representing three generations, have been buried in one grave. They died from poisoning and seven other persons in the neighborhood have been stricken. Arsenic has been found in a barrel in which water for household use had been stored, but some of the victims had not drunk any of the water in the barrel. It is said that in the case of a young man death was traced to arsenic. The grand jury has been making an investigation.

Butte Lineman Electrocuted.

Butte, Mont., May 27.—George Isaacs, a lineman, was electrocuted today by grounding an incandescent wire at Anaconda. Isaacs made the connection by the rivets of his leather gloves coming in contact with the wire, 2,000 volts passing through his body. His safety belt caught him, and for several minutes the gruesome spectacle of a corpse hanging in midair was witnessed.

Magdalena Islands to Be Sold.

Haitian, N. S., May 28.—An agent has left here for New York to close the sale of the Magdalena Islands by the government of Quebec to an American syndicate. They are rich in iron and manganese, and the herbage, fisheries are valuable. It is said the Dominion government may take some action to prevent the sale.

## MINERS TAKE UP THE MOYER CASE.

Committee Appointed to Adopt Such Action as it May Deem Expedient.

## CHICAGO STRIKE WAS INDORSED

Members of Federation Called Upon to Refrain from Purchasing Chicago-Made Shoes.

Denver, Colo., May 27.—The committee on affiliation of the Western Federation of Miners with the American Federation of Labor did not report at today's session as was expected.

For the first time since the opening of the convention the case of Charles H. Moyer, the president of the federation, who is held a prisoner by the military authorities at Telluride, was taken into serious consideration. A committee composed of M. Gillis and F. L. Reber of Butte, and M. D. Moore of Arizona, was appointed to take such action as might be deemed expedient in releasing President Moyer.

Resolutions were adopted endorsing the stand taken by the 3,000 members of the Chicago Boot and Shoe Workers' union, who were locked out May 1 for refusing to accept the "open shop" rule as well as a reduction of wages. In these resolutions the members of the Western Federation of Miners are called upon to refrain from purchasing Chicago-made shoes, it having come to the knowledge of the convention that such shoes are sold extensively in sections of the country where the Western Federation of Miners is strongly organized.

The proposition of adding a member of the coal miners' union to the executive board was freely discussed, but no action was taken.

Honorary membership was granted to Freeman Knowles of Deadwood, S. D., upon request of the miners and millers' union there.

The abolition of the union transfer cards was another topic discussed today.

At the conclusion of the session the convention voted to renounce the buttonhole carnation, which, in the language of Secy. Haywood, had "grown to be the crusher's emblem."

Memorial day will be observed in the convention and the graves of the late Rev. Myron Reed and the late Gov. Davis H. Waite will be decorated.

Secy. Haywood says that important changes in the constitution and by-laws will be proposed by the committee on that subject.

## DEAD MAN IDENTIFIED.

Was L. J. Hall and Looks Like a Case of Murder.

Chicago, May 28.—The Record-Herald today says: According to the police of Whiting, Ind., the identity of the man whose dead body was found in a loaded naphtha tank car yesterday has been finally established. He was L. J. Hall, 20 years old, of Wolf's Lake, Ind., and the police believe that he was murdered and his body placed in the car.

A young man whose name the police withheld, and who had been employed in the shipping department of the Standard Oil company's plant at Whiting, and a woman 20 years old, to whom both Hall and the missing man are alleged to have been attentive, are being sought by the police.

Hall had been employed as clerk at the Wolf Lake club house. He left the club house last Friday night and that was the last time his friends saw him alive. When and where he lost his life remains to be solved, but marks of violence on his head and body indicate the manner of his death.

When last seen Hall carried a gold watch and chain and had a sum of money, all of which has disappeared.

## PAPACY MUST KEEP HANDS OFF.

Premier Combes Says it Will Not Be Permitted to Meddle in France's International Affairs.

PRETENSE OF TEMPORAL POWER

He Termed it a Superannuated Friction That Disappeared Thirty-Four Years Ago.

Paris, May 27.—After an exciting debate, in which Premier Combes and Foreign Minister Delcasse set forth the action and purposes of the government toward the vatican, the chamber of deputies today, by a vote of 427 to 95, approved the course of the government in recalling M. Nisard, ambassador to the vatican, and rejected all proposals of the extreme element for an immediate dissolution of the relations between church and state.

A resolution proposed by M. Ferrette, Republican Nationalist, inviting the government to negotiate with Pope Pius for a separation of the church and state, was defeated, 507 to 18. A motion by M. Allard, Socialist, to break off at once all relations with the vatican and to denounce immediately the concordat of 1801, was defeated, 385 to 146.

Premier Combes took the initiative in resisting all efforts to force the government to extreme action and his request that all questions regarding the separation of church and state go over until next January has the effect of postponing separation beyond the present session of parliament. M. Ribot, minority leader, was among those voting in support of the government.

The debate attracted unusual attention and great crowds were present, including Ambassador Porter and other members of the diplomatic corps.

The principal speeches were those of Premier Combes and M. Delcasse. The premier asked the chamber to leave the debate to its true significance. The question, he declared, is a document hurled to France, had denounced to certain European powers in the insult which it alleged the head of the French state had inflicted on it by returning, in the undignified capital of his kingdom, the visit received from the king of Italy and by refusing to admit the claim of the ultramontanes to prerogatives presented as untenable. The government had arrested this document by immediately recalling the ambassador to the vatican.

"This recall," said Premier Combes, "signifies that we can not allow the holy see to interpret the presence of our ambassador in Rome in a sense favorable to its claims or to make use of his presence to justify pretensions which we reject. It also means that we will not allow the papacy to interfere in our international relations, and that we intend to have done, once for all, with the superannuated fiction of temporal power, which disappeared thirty-four years ago. We will not withdraw the whole staff accredited to the vatican, as we are bound by the concordat to maintain at the vatican an agent of our government for carrying on of business. We cannot suppress the embassy and its concordat by our own authority for that right belongs to the chambers."

PUSH CART PEDDLERS.

Those in New York Must Display their Photos on Carts.

New York, May 28.—Hereafter all push cart peddlers doing business in New York, will be required to display their photographs on the sides of their carts. Notice to this effect has been served on the president of the Peddlers' association by Mayor McClellan.

This is the mayor's own plan for solving the license problem and preventing one cart from being used as a family affair.

News of the order today spread among the East Side peddlers and they loudly denounced it as oppression. They immediately planned to march upon city hall with their wives and off-

## CONDUCTORS MAY STRIKE.

Rochester, N. Y., May 28.—It is believed that a strike of the conductors and trainmen on the Rochester and Buffalo division of the Buffalo, Rochester & Pittsburgh railroad will soon be called unless concessions asked by the men are granted. The exact nature of the difficulty cannot be learned, but it is known to involve an increase in wages and a shift of the working forces on the two divisions that was made a few weeks ago.

A. R. Garretson, assistant grand chief of the Order of Railway Conductors and Fitzpatrick, of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, have returned to Cedar Rapids, after having failed to reach an agreement with the company.
