Quite a number of youngsters were caught in the act of attempting to climb over the fence into the grounds. In one case eight were captured, and after being lectured by President McDonald, were allowed to see the sights of the fair grounds.

AMUSEMENTS.

One more of our native song birds who went broad to cultivate her gifts, returned and was given a royal reception at the Tabernacle last evening.

Few have been greeted with handsomely audiences to bid them welcome home. There must have been two thousand people in the body of the hall and the gallery when the program—some what belated—began last night.

Miss Anderson was given a warm reception on her entrance, and any number of enthusiastic plaudits after the various numbers which she rendered.

Her selections ranged from very difficult airs which fully tested the big possibilities of her voice, down to light English ballads. If the idea was to demonstrate the wonderful range of her voice, she fully succeeded, for in one selection people had made up their minds that she was a contralto, and in another she took notes which almost proclaimed her a soprano. Probably it would be more just to say that her best work is in the middle register.

Her voice gives the impression of one that has rare possibilities which will increase with maturing years, as she is yet one of the youngest of our soloists. She did some beautiful work and the full consciousness of some of her tones was in striking evidence in such numbers as the "Lullaby" by Brahms, the "Lullaby" by Handel, and the "Lullaby" by Kimmell. This number was one of the gems of the evening, and was made notable by the fact that the young composer presided at the piano, while Mr. McCallum sang to the organ, and Mr. Weihe played the obligato.

The author of the words is Mrs. Lydia D. Alder. Miss Anderson was also heard to fine advantage in the difficult aria from "Samson and Dalila." She was called back after each number, but only one encore was given, a ballad in English after the "Lullaby."

Another effective number was the re-arrangement of the old chorus "Daughter of Error" by Mr. Stephens (now called "Gospel Restoration.") In this beautiful number Miss Anderson and the choir did excellent work.

"Hallelujah" in good fashion, but was at its very best in the accompaniment to Mr. Kimmell's "Gypsy Sweetheart," a number that had a true and better advantage. In the "Muslin Mazurka" which he had to give as a recall, he was at his very best.

Miss Anderson will remain in Salt Lake at present and will open a studio for a limited number of pupils.
