MANAGER OF THE HALL.

Charles Loefdahl testified in substance as follows: That he was at the party on Christmas eve at the Finn all and saw trouble between the fendant and one Dick Carlson; that after the trouble was settled he saw John Backman, the deceased, come into the ball room and attack the defendant; that after a scuffle between them the defendant fled from the deceased and as he was running away the deceased threw a bottle at him and struck a young lady, wounding her severely; that shortly thereafter the defendant, who was the manager of the hall, re-turned with a shotgun, and upon enter-ing the room said: "I will see who is running this hall. Where is the devil? I will give it to him." A brother of the deceased immediately attacked the defendant and endeavored to take the gun away from him; that in the struggle the gun was discharged and John Eastman was killed.

KICKED OUT DOOR PANEL.

The next witness called was Gua Smith, who testified in substance the same as the previous witness, but ad mitted that immediately prior to the trouble which resulted in the killing of Backman he told the deceased that the defendant had previously assaulted Vic Carlson; that the deceased at that time was in his own home a short dis tance from the hall; that the deceased immediately kicked out the panel of his loor in his apparent haste to get to the dance hall; that upon arrival there the trouble commenced which resulted in his death, as told by other witnesses. The last witness for the state today was Fred Sundall, who testified that

upon hearing the shooting he ran to the hall and met the defendant at the gate-way and asker him who was doing the shooting. He stated that he was. The witness asked the defendant why he was doing it and he replied: "Do you think I am going to let John Backman kill me with that chair you see there?" That the defendant gave his gun to the witness, who subsequently delivered it to the sheriff. This witness was still on the stand at the adjournment of
