PETERSON TRIAL RESUMED.
Interesting Testimony Given—Prosecution Will Close Tomorrow.

Nephi, March 21.—The trial of the Peterson homicide case was resumed today before Judge Marionaux. Attorney E. M. C. Stott of Eureka was called by the prosecution to identify the declaration made by Backman.

The court admitted the statement taken at St. Mark's hospital in Salt Lake on January 1st, which showed that the deceased was shot by the defendant on Christmas morning while Backman was going to his home from Finn hall, and that the deceased said that he did not know why the defendant shot him.

On cross-examination Mr. Stott said that the deceased at the time of making the statement said that prior to the shooting he was so drunk that he did not know what occurred, but that he then remembered him up, and that he then remembered that he was going home. Backman also said that he did not remember anything about the trouble at the hall nor of the meeting of his associates prior to the shooting, at which it was arranged that he would go and begin trouble with the defendant. The witness said that he did not ask the deceased if he attacked the defendant with a chair outside the hall or whether he dropped the chair at the gate when he was shot.

MANAGER OF THE HALL.
Charles Loeftahl testified in substance as follows: That he was at the hall on Christmas Eve, the night of the shooting, and saw trouble between the defendant and one Dick Carlson; that after the trouble was settled he saw John Backman, the deceased, come into the hall, and that he saw the defendant and Backman attack the deceased; that after a scuffle between them the defendant fled from the deceased, and as he was running away the deceased threw a bottle at him and struck a young lady, wounding her severely; that shortly thereafter the defendant, who was the manager of the hall, returned with a shotgun, and upon entering the room said: "I will see who is running this hall. Where is the devil?" He then went to the door, and the deceased immediately attacked the defendant and endeavored to take the gun away from him; that in the struggle the gun was discharged and John Eastman was killed.

KICKED OUT DOOR PANEL.
The next witness called was Gus Backman, who testified in substance as follows: That he was at the hall on Christmas Eve, the night of the shooting, and saw trouble between the defendant and one Dick Carlson; that after the trouble was settled he saw John Backman, the deceased, come into the hall, and that he saw the defendant and Backman attack the deceased; that after a scuffle between them the defendant fled from the deceased, and as he was running away the deceased threw a bottle at him and struck a young lady, wounding her severely; that shortly thereafter the defendant, who was the manager of the hall, returned with a shotgun, and upon entering the room said: "I will see who is running this hall.
