A CLOSE CALL.

A peculiar fire loss—without a fire—was settled in Brooklyn last week. The insured, having a contagious disease in the family, had the house fumigated. Sixteen sulphur molds on the candle style (the base being of metal) were placed on the floor in soup plates, the plates being filled with water. The insured did this as an extra precaution. The owner then locked the house, not returning until a week later. When he came back he found that the heat from the candles, combined with the gas generated, had caused the water, cracked the plate into two pieces, buried a hole in the rug, and also in the parquet floor underneath it. The damage to the floor was \$50 and to the rugs over \$200. The engines were not called out, and no one knew of the fire until the owner opened the house. Each of the 16 plates was broken right in two. The damage was each rug and to the flooring was identical.—Insurance Press.

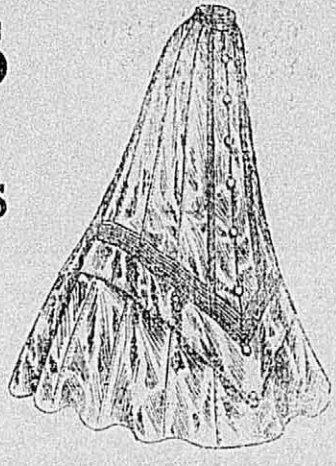
