## WEEKLY WEATHER SUMMARY.

Following is the local weather sum mary for the week ending Monday evening last: The week opened with high temp-

erature prevailing throughout the state, and except in the southeastern counties the temperature remained above normal throughout the week. The heat was intense in the northern counties, the temperature averag-ing almost 10 degrees above normal, and temperatures of 95 degrees to and temperatures of 95 degrees to above 100 degrees occurring on sev-eral days. In the southwestern coun-ties the mean temperature was about 2 degrees above normal, and in south-eastern it was about 2 degrees below normal. As a rule the nights were quite cool.

There was somewhat more than the usual amount of cloudiness, and local thunderstorms visited almost all parts of the state. In some localities the rainfall was very light, but over most of the state it was in excess of the normal, and was sufficiently heavy to settle the dust. In a few localities the precipitation was copious, greatly benefitting vegetation. Some observ-ers report the electrical display to have been unusually brilliant. Light hall feil in isolated localities, doing no material damage. Wind velocities were light except during the occurrence of thunder-storms. Water in streams is low, but the supply is better than is usual at this season. There was somewhat more than
