Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 29.69 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 20 degrees; maximum, 32; minimum, 13; mean, 22; which is 2 degrees below normal.

Deficiency of the daily mean temperature since the first of the month, 1.45 inch, which is .97 inch above the normal.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer has fallen in nearly all districts except Montana, and Assinibola. The highest pressure remains over the middle plateau, north Pacific coast, and the west Gulf states. The low pressure area is central over South Dakota and Nebraska.

Precipitation occurred principally over portions of Wyoming, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Illinois, Missouri, Nebraska and the Canadian provinces. It was snowing this morning at Kansas City, Chicago, Omaha, Rapid City, Huron, Bismarck, and St. Paul. The temperature has risen in nearly all sections. No zero temperature was reported. Freezing temperature extends as far south as New Orleans.

CHOIR WILL GO TO WORLD'S FAIR.

Tabernacle Singers Have Practically Decided to Make The Trip.

SERIES OF CONCERTS EN ROUTE

Those Who Desire to Go With Them Should Make Application in Short Order.

At the regular meeting of the Tabernacle choir, held Thursday evening, plans for a trip to the St. Louis exposition were thoroughly discussed by the members, and the conclusion reached that such a trip should be taken. If the plans carry—and the enthusiastic manner in which the choir has taken hold of the matter is a guarantee—the choir will leave this city the latter part of June, giving concerts en route and a grand concert at the exposition.

The matter of entering the choral contest was not decided at the Thursday meeting, but will be taken up next week, when it is expected that there will be a full attendance of the choir.

After visiting the fair the trip will be continued by steamer, up the Mississippi River from St. Louis to Nauvoo, and from there the choir will go to Carthage and other points of interest connected with the history of the Latter-day Saints. This journey from St. Louis to Nauvoo will be one of the most interesting features of the trip.

In order that the reputation of the choir may be maintained, it will be necessary for all members to attend the rehearsals and become thoroughly familiar with the program that will be carried out. As is usual on such excursions it is expected that many who are not members of the choir will desire to take the trip. That they may secure a place it will be necessary for them to apply at once and make arrangements as early as possible that all details may be speedily attended to, and that no delays may occur.
