# THE RUSSIANS IN MANCHURIA.

They Are Acting on the Defensive-At Port Arthur Sounds of Desultory Firing Are Heard Nightly.

London, Feb. 21 .- From a reliable quarter the Morning Post's Chefoo correspondent says he learns that tens of thousands of Japanese are advancing by forced marches from various parts of Korea on the Yalu river, and that severe fighting is expected shortly.

A dispatch from Paris says the Paris edition of the New York Herald prints a dispatch from its St. Petersburg correspondent saying that it is reported there that in a fight on the Yalu river the Russians met repulse, with a loss of 2,500 killed. No confirmation of this been received.

The correspondent at Tien Tsin of the Standard reports an attack by 500 Chinese "brigands" on the Russian post

at Foochow as probably an attempt to wreck the railway. It is said that Viceroy Alexieff has asked the ministry of marine to send him officers who are not too young, and admirals who are not too old, of whom he already has too many. The viceroy has issued proclamations to the Chinese throughout Manchuria seeking to enlist their sympathy in behalf of Russia. The official report of the battle of Chemulpo, given by M. Pavloff, Russian minister to Korea, who left Seoul for China Feb. 13, according to a St. Peters-burg dispatch, is practically identical with the report previously cabled. M. with the report previously cabled. M. Pavloff says that the Japanese cap-tain of the cruiser Takachiho sunk his vessel the night following the battle, vessel the hight following the pattle, and that the Russian fire silenced the Asama's fore barbette and wrecked her bridge. The Asama transferred 80 killed or wounded to a transport.

CENSORSHIP NOT REMOVED.

London, Feb. 21 .- It begins to look as if the announcement from St. Peters-burg a few days ago that the censorship over newspaper dispatches had been removed was somewhat premature. Since the "removal" of the censorship very little of consequence regarding the movements of the armles in the far east has come through. What few dis-patches have been received are very much pro-Russian in tone and other-

From cablegrams regarding th movement of warships during the past few days, although none of the dis-patches have been verified, men skilled in the game of naval warfare here look for the next big sea fight to take place somewhere in the vicinity of Shanghai, off the China coast. In support of this theory or forecast, it is pointed out that most of the ships of the non-combatant powers, including a number of United States vessels, have been ordered to Shanghai. as follows: "Although the United States wishes to send a consul to Dainy, it is certain to send a consul to Dalny, it is certain that the Russian government alone can judge whether it is desirable to issue all exequatur to that effect. It is nec-essary to remember that, while Man-churia belongs to China, Russia holds Port Arthur and Dalny under a lease from the Chinese government. The war was commenced by Japan, which practically has established a state of slege at those points. What is more natural than that the laws of war should be extended to these points and that the authorities should refuse to that the authorities should refuse to grant an exequatur to a foreign consul?

"If it pleases the United States to ask China to issue exequaturs for consuls at Mukden and Antung, it is their right to do so. But the actual situation confers upon us certain rights. Manchuria being the theater of war, occupied by us and recognized by the United Staes and other powers as outside of the Chi-nese zone of neutrality, it is for our military authorities to judge the question of receiving these consuls, even if China grants them exequaturs.

"I do not know the decision of Vice-roy Alexieff, but they (the military authorities) are free to take any action they wish."

RUSSIANS HANG JAPANESE.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 21.-A dispatch received here from Harbin, Manchuria, dated Feb. 20, says the railroad is in working order and that the Japanese who attempted to destroy the Japanese bridge over the Sungari river have been hanged. Bands of Chunchus (bandits) have been observed under Japanese leadership and are being pursued. Almost all the civilian inhabitants of Harbin have left, and the remainder of the population is quiet. The movement of troops is causing heavy traffic on the railroad. All of the Japanese laborers on the railroad fied, and the Chinese laborers have returned to work after their New Year celebration. ## SORE AT THE UNITED STATES.

Because Commander of the Vicksburg Did Not Protest Against the Japanese Bombarding.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 21 .- The appointment of Gen. Kuropackin, who was yesterday relieved of the functions as minister of war, to the chief command of the Russian army in the far east, was gazetted this morning.

With the possible exception of Gen. Dragomiroff, formerly governor general of Kieff and later member of the council of state, Gen. Kuropatkin is the most popular man in the Russian army. As a bluff old soldier who has fought his way up from the bottom to be minister of war, he is the ideal of the enlisted men. Not one in the czar's army has seen more fighting, and no one can tell a story better. There is never a dull moment in his company, for he intermingles the humorous in-cidents of his campaign with tales of the self-sacrifices of the men whom he led with Skobeleff over the parched wastes of Geok-Tepe or even the icy

slopes of Plevna. No one meeting the short, firizzled warrior in his charming home on the sunny side of the Molka would guess the extent of his power or the burden of responsibility weighing on his should-ers. As minister of war he was con-sidered a just chief who gave rewards and administered punishments without fear or favor. It is small wonder, therefore, that the Russlan army adarest him. adores him.

The appointment of Gen. Kuropatkin to direct command in the field has been received with enthusiasm, and his leadership inspires complete confidence that there will be no mistake and that Russian arms will be carried to sucess on land.

Gen. Kuroptkin will be accompanied to the front by the Grand Dukes Boris, Alexis, Nicholas and Michael Nikola-ivitch. The emperor and empress gave a luncheon today in Gen. Kuro-patkin and the grand dukes at the Alexandra palace, Tsarskoe-Celo, and bade them farewell.

The exact mission of Grand Duke Alexis is unknown, but it is undoubt-edly an important one, as he has been in supreme cammand of the Russian navy as president of the board of admiralty, taking active part in the ne-gotiations preceding hostilities. He presided at the special council which prepared Russia's undelivered reply to Japan.

Alexis paid a memorably pleasant visit to the United States when a young man. His career as high admiral is well known and brilliant, as he has always surrounded himself with a notable staff. The grand duke has

The story is that after the withdrawal of the Japanese fleet, and for the purpose of finding who was responsible allowing the Russsians to be surprised, Alexieff summoned the younger naval officers before him and demand-ed an accounting of their whereabouts on the night of the disaster. The young licutenant who was shot is said to have admitted that he was on shore

with some friends. No sooner was the admission made, so goes the story, than Alexieff drew a revolver and shot the young man dead in his tracks.

## **RESCUED CREW ARRIVES.**

#### German Steamer Albano Lands Men from the Kentigern.

New York, Feb. 21.-The German Sloman line steamer Albano, Capt Kudenhol, which arrived from Ham-burg today, brought to port Capt. Parker and 21 shipwrecked men belonging to the British freight steamer Kentigern, which they abandoned at sea on Feb. 16, in a sinking condition. Speaking of the sinking of the ship, Capt. Parker said today:

"We sailed from Portland on Sunday Feb. 1, bound for Limerick, with a full cargo of grain. On Tuesday while run-ning in a heavy sea, the stearing gear became disabled, but was repaired. It was not strong enough, however, to withstand the violent gale of the following Saturday and it broke down again. An effort was made to connect the handgear, but owing to the dark ness and terrific sea it could not be repaired and on the morning of the 14th ve discovered the hand steering gear broken to pieces, the wheel gone and complte wreck. By Monday the gale had increased to

a hurrricane; the cabins were flooded and the ship was lying at an angle of 30 degrees. The rudder was adrift, moving from side to side violently, and t was impossible to get any lashing to hold it firm. The steamer Albano finally came in sight and urgent signals were made to attract her attention. The Albano took all hands on board. The chief officer of the Kentigern had his arm broken and the chief steward had his legs bruised. The Kentigern was built at Glasgow in 1888, and was owned by Troops & Son.

Philippine Commerce. Washington, Feb. 21.—The development of the Philippines commercially and in-dustrially for the first nine months of 1900 is the subject of a special buildtin by the bureau of insular affairs. It is shown that both in imports and exports there was an increase compared with a corresponding period in the preceding year. Heavy exports of hemp and copra-offsetting heavy imports of rice, explain-ed the inrocase. During the period named the imports were \$25,601.60, against \$24-\$28,522 for 1962. The exports amounted to \$25,683,128, an increase of nearly four and enc-half millions dollars. The rice imports were the only ones in general trade, the United States losing to per cent and there was falling off in general trade, the United States losing of the amount of her trade in 1902.
