BULLFROG GOLD BAR MEETING

At First Annual Gathering Salt Lake Men Were Named As Directors.

MANAGER DAVIS' FINE REPORT

Treasury Contains Good Balance-Big Bodies of Ore Have Been Developed During Year.

At the first annual stockholders' meeting of the Bullfrog Gold Bar Mining company, held last Friday at Gold. field, 755,000 shares were represented The business done was chiefly discussion and acceptance of the manager's report and a consideration of the policy for the conduct of the mine.

The new directorate is composed of Dr. E. D. Woodruff of Salt Lake City, J. R. Davis, J. P. Loftus, Kenneth M. Jackson and N. P. Reinhart, with Mr. Loftus as president and Mr. Davis vice president and general manager. John Cook is treasurer of the corporation and W. A. Sherman, secretary, H. G. Mayer, assistant secretary.

Manager Davis' report given in great detail, shows that during the year's operation in drifts, shafts and crosscuts, there has been 2,355 feet of development work done; the lowest point reached being the working shaft, hav-ing a total depth of 300 feet. The great ledge at the 150-foot point has been en-tirely crosscut, and partially crosscut at the 250-foot point; the total cross-cutting amounted to 375 feet, and in addition 560 feet of drifting. In this amount of development, ore bodies have been blocked out and ready for mining,

The report of the president shows that this development work has been done at a cost of \$41,861,97. The total expenditures on the property, including a splendid equipment of machinery, amounting to \$48,660.55. The cash balance in the treasury is \$28,893.20, to which amount the treasury stock, at its present market value, \$115,000, makes the total in the treasury available for the business \$143,893,20.

This splendid showing, says the Goldfield News, whereby the employment of \$48,000 has in a single year resulted in opening a body of wealth of nearly \$2,500,000, is undoubtedly without a parallel in the recent history of gold inining, and is certainly a splendid tribute to the worth of Nevada's gold fields, and to the men who have ac-
