## THE LATTER-DAY SAINTS' COLLEGE

The Social hall was well filled on Wednesday by students of the Latterday Saints' college, parents and friends, members of the Sait Lake Stake hoard of education, and others interested in this important educational institution, to engage in and listen to the closing exercises of the ninth academic year. On the platform were President Joseph F. Smith, President Lirenz: Snow, Elder Elias Morris, president of the college, Dr. James E. Talmage, and other prominent citizens interested in the college work. The platform was handsomely decorated with roses, hyacinths, ornamental plants, etc.

The program today was of a most pleasing character, and was highly enjoyed by those present. The addresses were impressive, instructive and encouraging, and with the other exercises were entertaining to the large assemblage. The close of the school year finus the college in first class condition as an educational institution, whose work is worthy of highest commendation and the full support of the Latter-day Sainte.

The singing exercises were heautifully given by the college choir, a most efficient organization under the leadership of Eluci Thomas McIntyre.

After the opening hyme, prayer was offered by Eider H. W. Naishitt.
The program was then entered upon, commending with a finely rendered plane duct, by Misses Kate Romney

and Edna Coray.

Miss Ray Grant read an interesting and well written essay on religion and ethics. ology.

The work of auxiliary organizations is recorded as follows: In the Student's society, 14 sessions, at which the following educational workers have lectured, in addition to students an members of the faculty: Elder 8. W. Jenkinsen, Elder Abrabam H. Can-non, Dr. James E. Taimage, Prof. W. M. Stewart, Elder Ezra Robinson, Elder David McKeuzie, and Dr. J. M. Fanner; in lattes' class, young men's class, Priesthood meetings, and general theological class, bi-weekly meet-ings, with exercises by students and instructions by teachers; in the field club, visits to industrial establishments and localities of scientific interest, and the theological lecture courses, Elders David McKenzie, George Rey nolds and B. H. R herte having given valuable series of lectures on Bible evidences and Book of Mormon history.

According to Church stunding, the following is the registration of students: Seventies, 4; Etders, 11; Priests, 17; Teachers, 12; Deacons, 72; member, 120; uon-members, 7; total, 243.
