More Indian Troubles in Prospect.

G. S. L. CITY, March 5, 1860.

EDITOR NEWS-DEAR SIR:

Fault finding, at best, is unpleasant work, and seldom productive of good. But there are occasions when it is necessary to tell the truth, even though that truth should affect the interest and reputation of individuals who place great reliance on their standing in society to shield them from censure, even when justly deserved.

I passed through Iba-pah, or Deep Creek, on the C. and S. L. M. route, the other day, and learned that the Indians in that vicinity were assuming a threatening and hostile attitude towards the few settlers, in consequence of the singular conduct of some one connected with the Indian department here. I only remained a few hours to rest, and consequently did not gather many particulars. I was informed, however, that the Indians were in a starving condition, that they had killed one of Mr. Severe's oxen that day, and that they were exasperated at the non-distribution of the few goods which had been sent out there for them, and had expressed their intention of taking them by force. Mr. Faust, the station keeper at that place, had taken his family into Camp Floyd, fearing some outburst of violence from the savages.

Mr. Severe was absent at the time I passed, but Mr. Faust corroborates the above statement, and informs me that Mr. S. could have pacified the natives had he been authorized to distribute the presents among them-but for save them from starving; every man that is some reason he has been prohibited from donight. doing right has as much as he can do to mind ing what was evidently his duty, and necessary for the safety of the little community there.
