Washington, Aug. 2.—The American minister in Pekin has received a note from the foreign office announcing the opening to international trade of the following seven cities in Manchuria: Fenghuancheng and Lia Yang, in the province of Kirin, and Hai La Erh and Aibum, in the province of Hai Jung

With regard to the renting of land by foreigners at these places, the note states that special renting and building regulations will be drawn up by China, and until such regulations are decided upon, such operations will not be per-mitted. These seven cities are the last of a total of 16, which were to be opened in Manchuria, as provided in the China-Japanese treaty of 1905.
