Washington, May 28 .- The supreme court of the United States today reiteraied its decision of last term in the philippines case of Warner, Barnes & Co., and Frederic W. Lincoln, involving the validity of tariff collections in the Philippine Islands under the executhe order of 1898. The opinion was

CALIFORNIA GUARD.

Gov. Pardee Asks For a Loan to Pay Them.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 28.—Gov.
