FAIRLY BUSY HAVE **BEEN THE BROKERS**

This Week's Sales on the Mining Exchange Show a Big Increase

OVER SAME PERIOD LAST YEAR

Lower Priced Stocks Called For-Today's Closing Quotations And Sales.

The week on the mining exchange has been a fairly busy one. Many of the lower priced stocks have participated, but the demand for the higher priced ones has not been as pronounced as they were last week. Altogether, 259,184 shares were transferred, representing a valuation of \$110,868.82; which is a marked increase over the business done during the same pe-riod a year ago when 61,720 shares went for \$23,878.13.

Sliver King closed the week some what stronger; Daly Judge weakened, but recovered towards the last. Beck Tunnel, Lower Mammoth and Little Thief were among the most active of the Tintic stocks. All of them have made advances, the latter making notdevelopments in the mine. New York Bonanza of Park City has just about aeld its own all through the week and closed today on the sale of 1,500 shares it 34 cents. Utah of Fish Springs, has been on the active list and has been marked up with sales around \$1.20. This mine has been making a very enviable record during the present year and is giving its shareholders very good re-turns in the shape of dividends. Considerable inquiry has been made for Nevada Hills of Fairvlew, and several bundred thousand shares have changed Nevada Douglas is beginning to attract attention in the east, as well is locally. BOSTON CONSOLIDATED.

Stewart Ore Body Opened in 1879-Mill Was Destroyed.

In 1879 the old Stewart ore body of xidized gold ore-the oxidized capping of the sulphide deposit of the Eoston Consolidated-was discovered, says a staff correspondent of the El gineering and Mining Journal. everal years 30 stamps treated this gold ore from the Stewart No. 1 and No. 2, but in 1894 the mill burned Nothing further was done until 1897 when the present company was formed. Considerable prospecting was immediately undertaken, but in vain. The company finally learned from a miner, who had worked in the old Stewart mine, that in a certain one of the old tunnels a considerable body of sulphide ore had been found, but these workings had been abandoned as the milling ore near the sulphide was too base and would not amalga-mate well. This tunnel had caved long ago, but the company found the rails marking the location of the old tunnel. The caved rock was spiled through, following the track in all its crooks and turns, until at its end the sulphide ore body was found. Since then a large body of this sulphide ore has been developed, and last October a second ore body—the "upper chan-

nel" ore was discovered in the overlying limestone This sulphide ore occurs bedded with the strata. The lower, or Pea-body, ore body occurs at the contact between the quartzite and the overying limestones. Separating this from the upper channel ore body is a stratam of limestone about 30 feet thick, but varying according to the thickness of the Peabody ore. Both these ore bodies were formed by replacement in the limestone. They run east and west and dip to the north at an angle vary-ing from 30 to 50 degrees. Two approximately parallel faults, about 600 feet apart, having a northeast trend and a dip of about 80 degrees to the south and east, cut off the orebody.

The continuations have not been found

as yo The Peabody ore body has been opened up for about 330 feet along its strike and is about 240 feet wide, its thickness ranging from 35 to 65 feet. The upper channel has been developed for about 400 feet along its strike and is 60-to 65 feet wide. It varies from 30 to 50 feet in thickness. The whole vein is a mass of iron sulphide, carrying some chalcopyrite and a little chalcoeffe and pyrite. In a few places bunches of more silicious ore occur. The content in copper varies considerably in different parts of the mine, being 5 to 6 per cent and even more in parts, but the ore is so stoped that the shipments average about 3 per cent copper. This ore carries an from excess of 15 to 18 per cent for which payment is made by the smelter. The sulphide deposits is opened up by three adits, viz., the Armstrong No. 1, 2.900 feat long; the Peabody, 2,600 feet long and 105 feet higher; and the Top level, 160 feet higher, in which the sulphide ore was first found. The Armstrong No. 2, which is 250 feet bethe Armstrong No. 1, is in 200 . Ore was struck in this tunnel, feet. but nothing has yet been done on this The ore is mined by a system of square sets of peculiar framing. The timbers are framed in Oregon, whence they are received ready for use. All the ore is sent by chutes down to the Armstrong No. 1, where it is hauled by a 15 horsepower Westinghouse electric locomotive in trains of eight cars to the 609-ton ore bins placed along the Copper Belt railroad tracks near the portal of the tunnel. The cars are 16 cubic feet in capacity and hold about 1.5 tons of ore. The ore bins are being enlarged so that they will hold 1,300 tons. NEWS OF BINGHAM.

Camp is Taking on Many Changes Where Steam Shovels Work. A traveler riding from Bingham to

Upper Bingham can but remark up-on the many changes that are taking place along the read way, says the Bingham Press. The stream has been flumed for nearly half a mile and when it is entirely covered over, cannot tell that a stream of water is flowing down the canyon. The net road, when done, will be on the east side of what is now the creek, almost from the Union saloon to where it passes under the treatle of the Copper The flume is being buil Belt railway. of heavy plank and in some places will be covored by several feet of earth.

This leaves the present sight of the creek and the roadway for a dump-ing ground and a yard for the Utah Copper mine. It is understood the company will also erect some buildings to be used as offices and for other purposes. Where the new build-ings will be located has not been definitely decided.

The big steam shovel is kept steadlly at work changing the side of the mountain. The work is wonderful and the number of dump cars seen ready for work in the mines leads one to believe that the company is preparing to take out ore on a gigantic scale

The big blast at the Boston Consolidated plant, about which so much has been said, was fired on Monday at 1 o'clock. Notice had been given that the blast would be set off at that time and the greater number of the houses in camp were deserted and their occupants betook themselves to the surrounding hills. To some the day of judgment seemed near at hand, To others it seemed best to approach as near heaven as possible and so the highest mountain top was sought. We are told that one man took his family and all his personal belongings, save one cat, to the opposite side of the mountain. The blast itself was a disappointment to those who wanted some excitement. We are reminded of the story of the little girl, who was watching a great military parade. After the military pageant had passed by and everything had become quiet, she said she wished they would have a runaway. She wanted to see what

would happen. So a great many people of Bingham felt. They wanted to see what would happen if some of the large rocks were thrown into the air and rolled down the mountain side. Every precaution had been taken, however, by the company to prevent even the slightest accident and their efforts were entirely successful as not a particle of damage was done. The holes had been drilled so deep that no perceptible noise was made by the
