FOREIGN NEWS.

ENGLAND. had a blind The principal topics of interest in England are the Fenian movements and distress in London. The *Times*, a comic periodical, ridicules the alarm which pervades all ranks and classes in England because of Fenianism, asserting that the presence of half a million of foreign soldiers should not cause such a feeling. The leading journals look upon it in a graver light, and discuss the subject with much seriousness, viewing it as an absorbing question.

The following is a brief epitome of the results inflicted on the neighborhood of the Clerkenwell explosion:—Seven persons died in consequence of the explosion; forty-one persons badly wounded, involving loss of limbs and eyesight, maiming and general disfigurement; fifty-six persons, for the most part representing families, unhoused, with loss of furniture, tools, working materials, &c.; and as many as six hundred families in the vicinity suffering in health, person and property from the violence of the shock. The public subscription, for the relief of those suffering from it, up to January 12th, was over £7000. A meeting of between 6000 and 7000 unemployed hands from the shipyards of Millwall and Cubbit-town, was held, to bring before the notice of the public the deep distress existing for the last eighteen months in that district. Terrible distress is declared to exist in London among the poor.

Almost every town of importance in Britain has been enrolling special police to protect them against Fenian attempts. The reports of the prefects of the departments in regard to the state of public feeling generally concur in stating that the adoption of the army bill was received with disfavor, and that the measure is unpopular in the department. Paris correspondents of *The London Press* say a feeling of uneasiness is perceptible in political and financial circles. Though no one believes that war is threatened from any quarter, still the great activity in the armaments and dockyards of France, and the pressure brought to bear upon the Corps Legislatif for the passage of the army bill are circumstances which contribute to unsettle the feeling of security in the public mind, and to impair confidence in the stability of peace.

Eastern question, comments on certain mischievous articles on France and Prussia which have recently appeared in the Prussian papers, and declares that it is the evident desire of these journals to do all in their power to create discord and bring about a rupture of the relations now existing between Prussia and France. The *Epoch* says the Emperor is preparing, and will soon cause to be issued, a manifesto assuring Europe that it is the desire and the policy of his Government to maintain peace. It is reported, on good authority, that the Emperor has forbidden the publication of Prince Napoleon's pamphlet on the subject of the foreign and domestic affairs of France.

ITALY.
According to a statement made by the Government, the measures taken to prevent and put a stop to the late invasion of the States of the Church by the Garibaldians, have added 18,000,000 lire to the expenditures during the past year.

Prime Minister Menabrea has addressed a sharp note to the Spanish Government. It was called forth by the speech of Queen Isabella at the opening of the Cortes, in which it was announced that Spain was ready to interfere for the defence of the Papal States. Menabrea informed the Spanish Cabinet that Italy will not admit the intervention in her affairs of any foreign power save France, in whose case such intervention is only allowed by special treaty stipulations.

PRUSSIA.
The American Minister, Hon. George Bancroft, is now engaged in negotiating with the Prussian government for the establishment of a new commercial treaty between the United States and the North German Confederation.

RUSSIA.
It is stated that the Russian Government is now in a position to send 200,000 men to either the Turkish or Austrian frontiers at a few days' notice, and one of the Russian journals says that, although the Government may continue to circulate peaceful phrases at London, Paris and Vienna, it is known as a matter of fact there that war is imminent. It was recently stated that Prince Gortschakoff was about to resign his seat in the Russian Cabinet, and General Ignatieff, named as his successor, is strongly in favor of a hostile policy toward Turkey. The Turkish Government has recently adopted measures indicating an anticipated attack from Russia, but if Russia takes hold of the matter in earnest, and the Sultan is left without any foreign assistance to fight with the Czar, the contest cannot be a very long one, and its result will certainly be disastrous to Turkey.

SWEDEN.
The King, in his speech at the opening of Parliament, reviewed the state of the country, and entered upon the subject of the insufficiency of the army. He favored the enrolment of all the male population in the militia organizations, and the purchase of the most improved arms for the use of the army.

JAPAN.
Since the abdication of the Tycoon, Stots-Bashi, some fears have been entertained that the Japanese government would refuse to carry out the important treaties concluded last year with the Commissioners of the Foreign Powers.
