# MEN LAID OFF AT **CUMBERLAND-ELY**

Management Beats Miners by Discharging Men Before Strike is Called.

#### STARTED BEFORE CHRISTMAS

First Labor Trouble in the Ely District Throws Between 150 and 200 Men Out of Employment.

Further labor difficulties have broken out at the property of the Cumberland-Ely, at Ely, Nevada, according to reports received from there recently. The trouble which started before Christmas day has been smoldering until it finally burst forth by the laying off of all the men working the property, which was between 150 and 200.

Some time ago the shovel men working at the Veteran and Ruth shafts struck for higher wages. Before giving the company any notice to concede to their demands they struck. They gave the company three days in which to comply with the demands. The men who struck were operating the big steam shovel by which the property at that point is worked.

Before the three days had expired, all the men on the property called a gen-

the men on the property called a gen-eral strike. When this was done the eral strike. When this was done to union men found themselves in trouble and had violated their agreement. It was contented that the men had struck without giving the company a chance to comply with their demands. that there was no notice or no effort at arbitration. A meeting of the union was beid and as the union is said to see that they had brought trouble for themselves, all the men were ordered back to work.

#### STRIKE THREATENED.

During the holidays there was considerable fill feeting and a strike was threatened at any inhale. When the affair reached a climax several days ago, the company decided to take action. Instead of waiting for a strike to be called the company laid all the men off and closed down the greater part of the work.

Although it is denied by the company that the men were laid off to prevent a strike, it is certain that such was the case. The impression was given out that it was done to make various repairs and have other work done at the property. It is not believed that the trouble will last long as many of the miners are finding employment with other mining companies.

The property on which the strike occurred is eight miles from the town of Ely and many have already gone to

# FINK SMELTER **DECLARED SUCCESS**

Plant at Arthur Does Some Remarkable Work in Recent Test.

STATEMENT IS NOT OFFICIAL

Said to Have Smelted Out Copper Matte With Less Coal Than Old Process Used by Local Plants.

According to information obtained this morning by persons who should be in a position to know something of the success of the new Fink smelter, the success of the new Fink smeller, an experimental ore treatment plant at Arthur, near Garfield, the new process has been all that was expected of it. It is contended that it smelted copper ore with a remarkable degree of success. And this was done with but two tons of slack coal. Under the old process five times the amount of coal would have been necessary to obtain the same results.

would have been necessary to obtain the same results.

Samuel Newhouse, under whose di-rection the new plant has been worked, is at present in Portland, so that no official confirmation of the result could be obtained. Although those who are on the inside, so to speak, are enthusi-astic over the result, they are unwil-ing either to deny or confirm the story. "I understand that copper matte was successfully made by the new smelter," said a mining man this morning. "It

successfully made by the new smelter," said a mining man this morning. "It was done successfully with but a small amount of coal. As copper was easily smelted it is certain that lead-silver ores can be as successfully treated.
"I believe that it is the intention of the inventor as well as Mr. Newhouse, who is backing him, to endeavor to produce blister copper. As to this it would be hard to judge the outcome, but of the other success is certain.

MEANS MUCH TO LITAH. MEANS MUCH TO UTAH.

"The new process means good bye to the highbinders in the smelting business. Under the now process createn be smelted at a price which will make the lowest grade of copper a successful mining venture. Just what it means to Utah in dolairs and cents would be bard to estimate."

It is understood that experiments at the new smelter will continue for some time before any definite statement will be made. Nearly all the local grades

time before any definite statement will be made. Nearly all the local grades of ore will be tried and an effort will be made to produce blister copper. There seems to be little doubt as to the success of the first run of ore.

After the plant was started up on New Year's day the furnace was warmed up in a remarkably short time. For 18 hours a fine white heat was maintained before any ore was treated. It is understood that scarcely any difference was shown when the ore was ference was shown when the ore was treated.

The plant has been closed down to make some minor repairs before starting up for other tests.

# STOCKS IN DEMAND PRCES ADVANCED
