Systematic Agitation for a Change of Date to be Started.

New York, July 27 .- Official steps looking to a systematic agitation for a change of the date of holding the presidential inauguration has been taken, says a special from Washington to the World. Resolutions adopted the last inaugural committee meeting were laid before the district commissioners with a request for an appropri ate action

It is understood the commissioners are in favor of a date later than March 4 and will bring the matter to the attention of Congress and the governors of the several states and terri-

tories. The plan proposed by the inaugural committee is that a national commit-tee be appointed, composed of the governors of the states and territories, fifteen additional citizens of the coun-try at large and a representation of oremost residents of Washington. This committee is to select the date and procure by congressional enactment the change desired.

New York, July 27.-Rudyard Kip-ing has written for the Imperial South African association what he calls a "Tract for the Times on the Science of Rebellion," according to a dispatch to the Tribune from London. The tract s directed mainly against the bond presidency which is described as seeking to attack England through her pocket and keep Cape Colony on the see-saw, filling i
