AGRICULTURE IN COUNTY SCHOOLS

County Supt. McKay Introduces New Study for Boys—Domestic Science for Girls.

FUNERAL OF PREST. FLYGARE.

Remains May be Viewed Saturday Afternoon and Sunday Morning—Serious Charges Against Toller.

Ogden, Feb. 22.—A new departure in the line of study to be taught in the Weber county public schools has been inaugurated by county superintendent Thomas E. McKay. Most of the students in the county schools live either on a farm or their parents have orchards, and Mr. McKay thought it would be an excellent departure to give the students some talks every week on subjects that would be of special interest to them, in elementary agriculture. At the last meeting of the teachers of the county schools, Supt. McKay gave the teachers a talk on elementary agriculture in the public schools, and an outline on the life history of the codling moth, which does so much damage to the fruit crop by causing worms. During this month that subject is being taught the students, and the best methods known to kill it. The success with which the teachers meet in the new work will be reported at the next institute. The girls are being taught domestic art at the Hooper school as an experiment, which is meeting with success and it will be extended to the other schools.

FUNERAL OF PREST. FLYGARE.

CHARGES AGAINST MANAGER

Ogden, Feb. 22.—In the case of Harry J. Toller against the Edmund Toller company, the receiver of the company, Carl Rasmussen, has filed an answer to Mr. Toller's suit and a counterclaim to recover \$1,320 alleged to be due from plaintiff. The answer in the case makes some serious charges against Mr. Toller. It sets forth that Toller and several others filed articles of incorporation of the concern, setting forth that they had turned over to the company property worth \$700, which as a matter of fact was not worth more than \$200. The receiver denies that the company owes Toller \$964 as wages as claimed by him, but charges that plaintiff, while in the control and management of the business converted to his own use large sums of money and quantities of properties not accounted for. That according to the articles of incorporation Toller subscribed for 132 shares of capital stock

YOUTH SENT TO ASYLUM.

Willie Green, a lad of 16 years, was examined yesterday by Drs. L. Rich and E. M. Conroy, as to his sanity, and found insane and committed to the state mental hospital by Judge Howell. The boy's condition is very unfortunate and unusual. He

appears to have no conception of right or wrong, and has a very erratic temper. He first came to the attention of the officers a short time ago by breaking into a box car, but when the case was investigated it was found that he had been told to do so and simply obeyed. On another occasion he was told by other boys that it was his duty to break the windows in the home and in compliance with their instructions he threw rocks at the house, breaking almost every window in the house, and at times when he would get angry he was not responsible for his actions which were dangerous. Those who know him believe that with care at the institution he will get all right and be able to come home again.
