AGRICULTURE IN **COUNTY SCHOOLS**

County Supt. McKay Introduces New Study for Boys-Domestic Science for Girls.

Ogden, Feb. 22 .- A new departure in the line of study to be taught in the Weber county public schools has been inaugurated by county superintendent Thomas E. McKay. Most of the students in the county schools live either on a farm or their parents have orchards, and Mr. McKay thought it would be an excellent departure to give the students some talks every week on subjects that would be of special interest to them, in ele mentary agriculture. At the last meeting of the teachers of the county schools, Supt. McKay gave the teachers a talk on elementary agriculture in the public schools, and an outline on the life history of the codling moth, which does so much damage to the fruit crop by causing worms, During this month that subject is being taught the students, and the best nethods known to kill it. The success with which the teachers meet in the work will be reported at the next institute. The girls are being taught domestic art at the Hooper school as an experiment, which is meeting with suc-cess, and it will be extended to the other schools.
