#### COST OF FIREPROOFING.

Recorder Stanton reported that at a meeting of the joint city and county building committee held on February 24th, three communications were received from J. H. Bowman as follows:

No. 1—Agreeing to put in place materials and labor for fireproofing the building by the Ransom method for \$87,680.

No. 2—To furnish and put in place everything needed to fireproof the Denver Terra Cotta Lumber company pattern for \$116,845.

No. 3—To do the same by the Gladding & McBean pattern for \$119,671.54.

#### WANTS TWO SALT LAKE POLICEMEN.

Mayor Baskin sent in a communication from John Bonfield, chief of secret service of the World's Columbian Exposition asking for the appointment of two Salt Lake policemen to serve during the World's Fair at Chicago. Committee on police.

#### THE PLAT E MUDDLE AGAIN.

In the matter of establishing the street lines and grades in plat E, the committee on streets recommended that the city engineer be instructed to establish and place monuments at the intersection of all streets therein, and that the work be executed promptly, and that the rules governing the adjustment of the streets be decided by a special committee to consist of the city engineer and city attorney and the chairman of the board of public works. Adopted.

#### ACROSS THE RESERVATION.

Wantland and Lawson sent in a communication recommending that a special committee be appointed to confer with the Fort Douglas authorities with a view to securing the permission of the government to construct a boulevard across the reservation. Adopted.

#### GAS FRANCHISE.

The committee on improvements reporting on Wendell Benson's petition for a gas franchise, recommended that the matter be considered by the Council, provided the applicant evidences good faith by depositing \$20,000 with the city treasurer to be returned to him when the works are in operation. Laid on the table temporarily.

#### TEN TELEPHONES.

Chief of Police Paul asked that the department of which he is the head be given ten telephones to be placed in different parts of the city. Committee on police.

#### FEDERATED TRADES ADVICE.

The Utah Federated Trades and Labor Council, sent in resolutions adopted by that body on February 24th. The first related to the alleged

fact that the school houses being built by the board of education are not being done in accordance with the spirit of the contracts with the various contractors, but in a poor and unworkmanlike manner, to the detriment of the interests of the taxpayers. That the principal cause of this state of affairs lies in the system of subletting and reletting contracts at such prices that the workmen must slight their work in order to live; and that the manner in which the work is done necessitates large expenditures for repairs. In lieu of these alleged facts the Federated Trades and Labor Council passed a resolution in behalf of the city's interests that the board of public works and the school board and others having charge of the public works in the city shall require a compliance with the spirit of all contracts entered into between them and the builders and contractors on the public works to the end that the various improvements being carried on may be done in a substantial manner; and further demanding of the various officers having charge of the public works that they employ a competent superintendent for each building being constructed to see that the work was properly done.

The other resolution was relative to the gravity sewer system, asking by resolution that the council use its best endeavors to forward this work with all dispatch, as it will give employment to a large force of workmen. Referred to special sewer committee.

#### NOT TALL ENOUGH.

The committee on police recommended the confirmation of the appointment of John Hemple as policeman. Adopted. The same committee reported adversely on the appointment of J. M. Garey as policeman, because he falls below the standard rule as to height. Adopted.

#### STREET RAILWAY TAX.

Two members of the committee on improvements reported in the matter of the extension of franchise to the Salt Lake City Railway company, and recommended that 1½ mills per capita tax on all of their franchises be abolished and that the company be hereafter required to pay the city \$30 per car per annum, besides all taxes on their taxable property. Laid on the table for one week.

#### SANITARIUM FRANCHISE.

The ordinance granting a franchise to Harvey M. Bacon to erect and maintain a bathing resort and sanitarium was passed. The grantee is required under a \$25,000 bond to have the plant in question in operation within six months.

#### SEWER AND SIDEWALK ORDINANCES.

An ordinance levying the tax for the assessment of property on the west side of West Temple street, between Fourth and Fifth South streets, in sewer district No. 6, for sewer construction, was taken up and passed.

An ordinance confirming the assessments upon the property on Second South street, between East Temple and State streets, for the paving of the sidewalk on said street, was read three times and passed.

An ordinance levying the tax for the assessment of property on the east side

of Second East street, from the intersection of Fourth South and Second East 205 feet from the north line of Fourth South street, in sewer district No. 4, for sewer construction, was read three times and passed.

#### AFTER THE OLEO MEN.

Wantland moved that the food inspector be instructed to make a thorough investigation and report to the council concerning the use of oleomargarine in Salt Lake City, and that the city attorney be instructed to report to the council an ordinance, or indicate such other action as may be necessary to properly regulate the sale of oleomargarine. Adopted.

#### CITY AND COUNTY MATTERS.

Wantland offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the city recorder be instructed to ascertain by correspondence with other city authorities in the west, the rules and methods in force governing the adjustment of expenses in city and county limits and for city and county institutions, and submit a report giving the result of the investigation from cities and counties situated about the same and prescribing approximately the same problems as are found in the case of Salt Lake City and county.

#### THE BOULEVARD.

Wantland moved that the city engineer be instructed to submit a report giving his views concerning the route which should be selected for the proposed boulevard. Adopted.

#### WATER AGENT.

Evans moved that the Mayor be authorized to appoint an agent for the city as provided in the contract with the owners of primary water rights to the waters of Parley's canyon for 1893. Referred to committee on irrigation and the Mayor, with power to act.
