OGDEN, May 3 .- According to the decision rendered by Judge Howell of the district court, Utah has no local option law as was declared by Gov. Spry in his veto of the liquor measure passed by the last legislature. The case at issue was that against the county commissioners of Morgan county brought by D. A. Smyth, a saloon proprietor at Devil's Slide to compel than to issue a liquor license to him after the county had gone "dry." The court held that the commissioners in failing to issue the license to Smyth failed to usign a good and sufficient cause why the license should not be issued. olution to the Mayor and Council of Logan.

Council, Logan, Utah: Gentlemen-The board of trustees of the Agricultural college respectfully invite your attention to the fact that for a period of seven days the college has been deprived of water through failure of the city to furnish it through failure of the city to furnish it through this mains. We are also advised that this has occurred several times in the past and while the period has not been of such long duration, it has been of too frequent occurrence. This has meant severe loss on account of salaries and advantages taken from students of an educational nature. If

students of an educational nature. If it were possible to measure this loss in dollars and cents it would amount to thousands of dollars, independent of enormous risks run by the institution when it has been so entirely at the mercy of possible fire calamities. We respectfully suggest to your hon-orable body that for the sake of Lo-gan and the State of Utah, that the magnificent institution be not jeopar-dized again in the future.
