Moab.—No material damaging conditions. On the 25th, rain, hail, and snow. Highest temperature of the week, 55; lowest, 25.

Koshareh, Los. Fremont, Tear-dale.—Cold week, with snow and rain. Snow on the 25th, and on the 26th, sprouting nicely, but slow.

Parowan and Kanarra.—Spring work retarded by unfavorable weather. Snow on 25th and 26th.

New Harmony.—Heavy snow, crops look very poorly.

Virginia.—It still keeps cold and windy with light frost almost every night. Stock on the range picking up; many dead last winter.

The Utah Weather Bureau has issued the following for the week ending Monday, May 1st: From all parts of the Territory come reports of another cold, frosty and stormy week, the only redeeming feature of which was the rain that fell. There has been but little growth in some localities.

Utah.—The 25th rain on Sunday morning. Winter wheat making but little headway on grass on the range fed nearly gone.
