# WESTERN MARKET LETTER.

Special Correspondence Kansas City, Mo., Monday, Nov. 7 1904,-As usual, most of the Colorado and Panhandle cattle last week came first two days, and unfortunately they met the lowest markets of the wock. By Friday prices on everything, with the exception of common stockers and stock calves, had ad-vanced 15 to 25 conts from the low time Monday and Tuesday. The run today is only 7,000 head, account of near approach of election day, and prices are 10 cents higher than close of last week. Packers are very willing buyers of fat grass cattle, both steers and cows, just now, because they ress out better than at any other time during the season. For this reason most of the advance today is on western and southwestern grass cattle suit-able for the killers. Stock and feeding cattle will remain quiet till after election, tomorrow. One thousand fifty to 1,200 pound Colorado killing steers sold last week at \$3.50 to \$3.90 on the low days, and three and four year old Panhandle steers \$3.60 to \$3.50. Stockers and feeders from same terriiory sold at \$2.75 to \$3.65, mountain cows at \$2.50 to \$3.00, Panhandle cows \$2.25 to \$2.75. The market appears to be in a healthy condition, as the slight-

mediately brings a rise in values. There was very little change in sheep and lamb prices last week, but the market is 10 cents higher today. Utah ewes 107 pounds sold at \$4.00 today, some medium class wethers at same price. No good lambs are here today, but good to choice ones sell at \$5.50 to \$5.65. Mixed western sheep, consisting of wethers, yearlings and a few ewes, sold Baturday at \$4.15, and several strings of yearlings went at \$4.40. The first fed westerns put in an appearance to-day. Mexican yearlings, weighing 78 pounds, and they sold at \$4.65. Country demand still meets the supply of that class of stuff, and prices are unchanged, wethers and yearlings up to \$3.65, lambs \$4.25, ewes at \$2.50 to \$3.50, Receipts are considerably under this time last year, and markets strong accordingly
