In this behalf the office of commissioner for one and one-half years during which time I have made out two full annual reports, and discharged all the duties vested in person or by deputy as the law requires, and a sum of the expense has been incurred, while serving the cause of the people. When I resume the office there was no furniture, and I was compelled to purchase some all of which has been turned over to the State superintendent. For six months I have been compelled to make individual arrangements for lodgings, traveling expenses on account of the limited appropriation.

With this statement of expensiveness I respectfully ask you to appropriate enough money to satisfy the balance due on my account.

To balance of salary for one and one-half years, \$400 per annum, and the balance of expense traveling expenses necessarily incurred, the balance now remaining on my account, to be paid accordingly.
