MUZZLES IN PENNSYL VANIA. james Benn, Editor of Philadelohia North American. Attacks Late Senator Quay.

ALSO COVERNOR PENNYPACKER.

"If the Quays of Pennsylvania Want Unsmirched Biographies, Let Them Leave Records Free from Stain."

Guibrie, Okla., June 8 .--- The action of James Benn, the editor of the Philadelphia North American, in injecting state politics into an address before the National Editorial association here today, has caused a fight in the Pennsylvania delegation, which may be carried before the association tomorrow. The subject of Mr. Benn's address was "Muzzles in Pennsylvania," and his attack was directed against the late senator Matthew S. Quay and his biegrapher, Gov. Pennypacker. His 'action took Quay's friends in the convention completely by surprise. To-night F. B. McKee of Freeport, T. H. Marter of Bellefonte and F. S. Phelps of Erie, Pa., assert that they will pre-sent a resolution tomorrow condemn-ing Mr. Benn's course.

He hamed Mr. Quay for this severe law, elating it was Quay's governor that instigated it. He closed by saying: "There never was a Quay of Penn-wivania born who could form or in-vent a measure that would restrict the liberty of the press or hamper it in its constitutional right of public utterance. If the Quays of Pennsylvania desire unsmirched biographies let them leave behind them records free from stain. ## Paupers Go on Strike.

Paupers Go on Strike. New York, June 9.—Considerable merriment has been caused by a strike of paupers in a county almshouse just outside Jersey City. The men detailed to act as bakers organized and elected a walking delegate who notified the county board in charge of the institu-tion that his fellows would not knehd the almshouse dough until their names were put on the payrell with the al-tendants and other employes. The delegate explained to the com-mitteemen that the bakers were enti-tied to pay, because, unlike many oth-er paupers they do not desert the insti-uution during the summer months to recuperate at the seakner, and in the mountains, but remain at their duties in the bakeshop and work failtfully for the county. The committee rejected the demands and informed the strikers hat they would be put to work in the stone quarries if they do not return to work in the bakeshop.
