Mr. Moore Says He Will Spend Next Five Months in Development. In a conversation with a "News reporter last evening, George C. Moore who represents the parties having the option on the Sunshine Mining company's property, said that he expects to start a force of men at work in about two weeks. He says some eight or nine men will be employed for four or five months in the development of the ore bodies. Hitherto a great deal of exploratory work has been done in the arsenical ore, which requires roasting in order to eliminate the arsenic This cannot be done profitably, how ever, as the ore is too low grade. Those who look for anything sensational at the Sunshine for many months will be disappointed, as Mr. Moore does not in tend to erect a mill until he has devel-oped the ore bodies quite extensively. If this discloses ore of satisfactory If this discloses ore of satisfactory grade a mill will ultimately be built, but if it does not the present option will be abandoned. If the property is turned down by Mr. Moore, it may be put down as very improbable that any one will make a success of the property, at least under present conditions.

Banks Continue Increasing Business in Spite of the Flurry.

Notwithstanding the big financial flurry that has stirred the country during the past few days Salt Lake banks are receiving just as large and many deposits as ever and the business done by them is on the increase daily. There was absolutely no uneasiness here among financiers and the banking institutions went on with their business entirely oblivious to the grinding process going on at other places. New York has seen the consummation of ome mighty financial deals in the week anding with last Thursday, but for all that, its clearings surpassed those of Salt Lake by but 52 per cent during the same period. This was the only instance in which this city was outrun, all the others in the United States havfallen below Salt Lake's increased percentage resulting from her grand total of \$4,359.000.

BUSINESS NOTES

The swelling events of the past few days in local financial circles emphasize unmistakeably the fact that we are in the midst of an era of prosperity

inequaled in our previous history. The increasing bank deposits, the enormous advance in clearings over the same days last year, the heavy transactions in business and the best residence realty, the widely extending operations of our strong financiers who are interested in the sugar industry, the de-mand for labor, the advancing rents for business quarters, the scarcity of offices, the great number of buildings going up all over the city-it would be hard indeed to find a combination of circumstances more propitious and promising. There are, in fact, but few things lacking to bring again the actual boom conditions which existed from 1889 to 1892. There is the same which existed speculative feeling rampant in the com-munity, only as yet it seems to have confined itself to gambling in mining stocks, rather than in realty. As yet we have not the spectacle of boomers laying out plats on Ensign Peak, running excursions to the alkali flats bestowing high sounding suburban ti-tles on the wheat fields below the city. From such a recurrence of real estate madness, every one should pray that the town may be protected. We are in the midst of prosperity, undoubtedly,

and the wise man will make the most of it by keeping his head cool, by refusing to plunge into debt to gamble in stocks, and by taking advantage of the present sunshine to provide for the rainy day that sooner or later must inevitably come.

The dealings in local stocks during the past week have not been very numerous. Stocks have all held up to their previous stiff figures and some of them have attained new heights. Utah sugar is quoted at \$17,20 bid with none to be found. Home Fire has been in active demand but is also scarce. The latest quotations are as follows:
