

Philip B. Stewart Withdraws From the Colorado Republican Ticket.

ASSIGNS ILLNESS AS CAUSE.

True Reason Believed to be Naming of Gabbert for Re-election to State Supreme Bench.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 17 -- Philip B Stewari, recently nominated for governor of Colorado on the Republican ticket, tonight sent a letter to the Republican state chairman deduning the nomination. While the letter does not state H in so many words, the reason Mr. Stewart declined to run is on account of the placing of Justice William Gabberi on the ticket as candidate for reelection to the supreme beach. Before the convention Mr. Stewart advised against the nomination of Gabbert. hen the nomination was made Stewart was not present, being ill at hB He did not learn that Gabbert's name was on the ticket until Sunda and it is said he declared to State Chairman Vivian that he "would not the sample you sent me. A very diplomatic letter was sent for Chief Justice Gabbert, who was elected to the supreme bench six years ago as a Populist. Gabbert is said to have de clared he would not withdraw if the entire Republican ticket refused to run with him. 'I wish to express through you to the Republicans of the state my sincere appreciation of the honor conferred by my nomination and of the many personal assurances of regard and to as-sure you that my efforts for the success of the party and its principles will be in no way relaxed. PHILIPPINE STATIONS.

Maj.-Gen. Weston Reports Forty-one

Have Been Abandoned. Washington, Sept. 17 .- Maj. Gen. John F. Westen, commanding the department of Luzon, Philippine islands, in his annual report states that 41 stations have been abandoned during the year, and there are 28 stations, garrisoned by 5,360 American troops and 2,488 native troops. There are two brigade posts in the department, Fort McKinley and Fort Stilizenburg, and the latter is difficult of access and exposed. For a good portion of the year the wagon roads there are impassable.

Gen. Weston recommends that no where supplies are to be handled either by wagons or rall. Gen. Weston also quotes from the chief quartermaster of the department regarding this place, as follows:

"All commands are quartered either in temporary buildings of native ma-terial, or permanent barracks, con-structed with but few exceptions by the quartermaster's department. 'The ex-treme dampness of one season and the heat of another renders the construc-tion of permanent stone or humber buildings imperative. This should be done as a matter of ultimate economy curity to army stores from the effects and as the only means of affording se of violent storms of frequent occur-rence. It has been demonstrated that the temporary shelter constructed of bamboo and nipa and materials of a similar character become unfit for oc-

cupancy within three years." Gen. Wei on adds that in the event of the construction of another large post on the Island of Luzon, Batangas offers the best site, from the standpoint of economy of administration, easy em barkation, a good country for tactical instruction and a point of strategic value.

Willinington, N. C., Sept. 17.- For six or eight hours more than 200 men, wo-men and children were cut off from the mainland in imminent peril while cot-tage, botel and railroad property was damaged to the extent of \$19,000 by a fierce northeast storm which swept Wrightsville Beach, nine miles east of Wilmington today. The storm reached the zonith of its fury between 6 and 7 o'clock this morning. Hundreds of cottagers received their first intimation of danger upon awakening this morning to find breakers sweeping clear across the beach to the sound and rolling high up on the mainland, two miles beyond. Five trolley cars brought a number of early risers across the sound on the traffic be achieved in the sound on the

trestle by which it is reached, while the waves swept the trestle. Those left at the beach were afraid to cross the trestle, which gave way immediately after the last car reached the mainland. The storm increased in fury until noon, when the rescue work was begun

Surf boats were sent across the channel at great risk, bring first the women and children, then later the men, the last of the number being brought over at 5 o'clock this afternoon. Sheriff Frank H. Steadman was, among those caught at the beach and at once swore in a number of deputies, who closed the barrooms and patrolled the beach tonight to prevent looting of the places here. At Carolina Beach, further down the

mainland, there was some damage to cottages, but the residents had left there the day before on notice of fall-ing barometer. At Southport, at the nouth of the Cape Fear river, the harbor craft had a narrow escape from the storm, several of the passenger boats being damaged.

The Clyde liner Navahoe, due here at 4 o'clock this morning, had not yet arrived at 8 o'clock tonight. She prob-ably encountered the gale off this coast and put to sea to escape its fury. Tonight the storm abated and no
