All of the general officers of the Church were sustained without a single dissenting vote. Every Stake was represented in the big concourse of the Priesthood assembled, with the exception of Uintah Stake. The scene at the afternoon session, when the Priesthood occupied the stands and the main portion of the floor of the Tabernacle was one which will remain impressed upon the minds

He read a revelation, given through the Prophet Joseph Smith, at Nauvoo, Jan, 19, 1841. Its paramount themes are the organization, order and authority of the Priesthood. The reading was interspersed with running comments, explanatory of the more striking passages. President Anthon H. Lund addressesd the conference. He began by reading a part of the fourth chapter of Ephe-slans. He had been very much inter-ested in the remarks of President Smith. The organization of the Church is a perfect one. It is not new, nor has the bar of the fourth is the state of the it been effected by man; but it is the one which Christ established when He was on the earth. It was not the in-tention that this organization should be temporary. The world believes that the Apostles were a quorum to exist only in the ancient Church. But this is not the case, according to the passage just read. These officers are as necessary in the nineteenth and the trian theth centuries as they were in the first. If the body of Christ is to be edified. then these officers are necessary. More over, Paul tells us that these are to re-main till the Saints come to a unity of the faith.

There is a belief among some peopl that Christ had no regularly constituted church organization. But this is not church organization. But this is not true. Anciently, there were many branches of the Church, all subject to the authority of the head. Whenever there were disputes concerning any doc-trine, the matter was referred to the Apostles. Then the ministry has to be perfected. How is the Gospel to be preached to all the world? Now God has placed in the Church certain officers to do this, and without them this work could not be carried on.

This organization has not, however, continued down from the first century to our time. But the reason is not that it was not necessary. It is rather betively hand. cause of the apostasy. The Father be-cause of the apostasy. The Gospel was restored through the prophet Jo-seph Smith and the perfect organization was re-effected. The Lord said, long before he restored the Church, that He would bring about a "marvelous work and a wonder."

When the Church was organized in these days there were only nine who had been baptized. It was not possible had been baptized. It was not possible therefore, to institute the organization of the Church as it is today. There could not be twelve Aposties. But as time went on and the people were pre-pared for it, parts of this perfect or-ganization—this "marvelous work and onder"-were introduced.
