ROOSEVELT HUNTS THE GRAY WOLF

Dogs Soon Struck the Scent and Were Not Long in Dispatching The First Victim.

PRESIDENT IS ALWAYS AHEAD.

Two More Wolves and a Number of Covotes Were Killed-A Day of Great Sport.

Oklahoma City, Okla., April 10.-The president and his party began their return this morning after experiencing a vestern rainstorm during the night. A special from Frederick, Okla., says:

The wolf chase to which the president has been so eagerly looking forward to began early this morning at Camp Roosevelt, 18 miles southeast of here. There are about 40 dogs in the pack, and those which had not been tled have been nosing all around this portion of the reservation since they prrived in camp, and every now and then a cheery yelp told their masters hat they had scented some game. A score or more dogs belonging to John Abernathy, the famous wolf catcher, have been dieted and looked after as carefully as a trainer looks after a pugilist who is expected to retain the championship belt. In the chase today the training of these dogs was

noticeable.

The party of about a dozen, including President Roosevelt and his doctor, had not traveled far this morning until their dogs were leading them on to what turned out to be a fresh scent. Soon the leaders were rewarded by seeing in a neighboring raying a lank gray wolf deliberately loping as if purplidful. wolf deliberately leping as if unmindful of its pursuers. The dogs all seemed to catch sight of the prey at the same time, for horses and dogs now set forward with renewed energy. The wolf tried to clude its pursuers by dodging, but this only hurried matters as it enough the forement dogs, to catch up. abled the foremost dogs to catch up with its prey, as the wolf turned to beat off its assailants other dogs sprang upon the bristling animal and bore it to the ground, where it was quickly disstched without the aid of the hunters. We other wolves were killed in much be same manner before the almost dias about time for the midday meal.

The president was invariably at the head of the procession of riders. At one point, seeing some water in a buffawallow, he galloped to the spot before the dogs reached it and sipped up the refreshing liquid in good old-fash-loned cowboy style. The picked year-ling helfer from the Waggoner herd which was dressed and taken to the camp this morning, was much enjoyed by the president and his famished party. 

BEAR IS ALL READY FOR PRESIDENT TO KILL.

Newcastle, Colo., April 10.-The big pack train and camp outfit for President Roosevelt's party received hurryup orders to move today and Guides 'Jake" Borah and John Goff headed the procession of nearly 100 horses and 60 dogs south of Newcastle, where camp will be pitched for at least a week or 10 days.

As soon as the camp is well established the extra men, as well as several ranchmen and trappers who will be engaged, will scour the country in search of bear tracks. They will carefully note all the signs and general lo-cations, so when the president starts out there will be no delay in looking

Citizens of Newcastle are planning a novel reception to the president next Saturday morning, which will be subject to his approval.

It is proposed that a grand parade be held, in which President Roosevelt shall ride so he can be seen by the citizens. At the head of the procession will be a monster brown bear in a cage. The animal was recently captured and he is now at the residence of Frank Hillard, where he has succeded in killing at least a dozen dogs and injuring several men who ventured too near him.

Goff and Borah will put their pack of hounds in a corral and the bear will be given an hour's start for the hills. Then the packs will be set on the traff and President Roosevelt, Dr. Lambert, Philip B. Stewart and the guides will follow in hot pursuit. Will Quit Kansas and Live in Oklahoma.

Wichita, Kan., April 10.-Mrs. Carrie Nation, who is in jail here, today signed Nation, who is in fall here, today signed deeds conveying her Topeka property to private parties at a cost of \$7,000, and announced her intention, after serving out her fall sentence, of leaving Kansas and settling in Oklahoma, where she will devote attention to efforts to have a prohibition clause juserted in the constitution when Oklahoma services statehood.

Mrs. Nation is in prison awaiting decision of appeal to the district court for joint smashing, for which she was fined \$150 and sontenced to 30 days in jall. The property sold was that which the Woman's Christian Temperance union at the state convention here last October refused to accept as a gift from Mrs. Nation.

BUDGET DAY IN THE COMMONS.

Chancellor of the Exchequer, Austen Chamberlain, Makes His Annual Statement.

REVENUE EXCEEDED ESTIMATE.

Business of the Empire Gradually Recovering-Large Reduction of National Debt.

London, April 10.-Budget day atracted a large crowd of members of parliament and visitors to the house of commons today and when the chan cellor of the exchequer, Austen Chanberlain, rose to make his annual state ment, the house was well filled in all

At the outset Mr. Chamberlain put his hearers in a good humor by announcing that the revenue of the year just closed exceeded his estimate by nearly \$15,000,000, showing that the trade of the country had turned the corner and whereas a year ago there was a heavy deficit there had now been established something more than equilibrium between the revenue and expenditures.

Mr. Chamberlain estimated the expenditure for 1905-6 at \$705,160,000 and the revenue on the existing basis of taxation at \$720,020,000, leaving a surplus of \$14,860,000.

The tax tax is wedweed by four cents

The tea tax is reduced by four cents from July 1, the date on which the existing duty expires. There is no reduction of the income tax.

Although 1904 began badly, said the

chancellor of the exchequer, a bounti-ful crop of cotton had revived the Lancashire industries, ship building showed signs of recovery and the iron Lancashire industries, ship building showed signs of recovery and the iron and steel industries had slightly improved. Nevertheless, while the country was on the path of moderate but steady recovery, it could not be said that 1844-5 had been wholly satisfactory from the view point of commerce and finance. There had been much pauperism and distress.

In analyzing the items of revenue, Mr. Chamberlain said the sugar duty promised to prove an expanding revenue, and the tax fell short of the estimates, mostly during the last quarter

enue, and the tax fell short of the estimates, mostly during the last quarter of the year. The experts of coal marked a record, but the decline in the excise duties on spirits, which commenced in 1900, continued. The consumption of beer and spirits was less in 1904 than in any of the preceding 15 years. In fact, said Mr. Chamberlain, the habits of the people are changing and this must be taken into account in considering the financial situation. The majority of the people are finding other employment for the money they used to spend in public houses. Outgoor recreation and excursions are becoming

more popular. Turning to the expenditure of 1904-5 Mr. Chumberlain said it had been be-low the estimates and the actual real-\$27,700,000 and at the close of the year stood at \$3,775,360,000.

Dealing with the finances of the new year, Mr. Chamberlain estimated the expenditure for 1205-6 at \$705,160,000 and the revenue on the existing basis of taxation at \$720,020,000, leaving a surplus of \$14,860,000.

but he had no doubt regarding what had the first claim on the country's resources. The first thing to do was to restore the national credit. He pro-posed that \$5,000,000 should be added to the fixed debt charge to create a sink-ing fund for the \$50,000,000 in trensury bonds falling due in December and which he proposed to re-issue as new bonds for 10 years with the condition that one-tenth be withdrawn and re-paid each year. This disposed of \$5,000,000 of his surplus.

Incidently the chancellor of the exchequer said he hoped that the first installment of the \$150,000,000 of the war contribution promised by the Transvaal would be available in 1906.

In the meanwhile repayments from the Transvaal on account of railroad work and sales of stores, together with the sinking fund at the government's disposal, would wipe out \$20,000,000 of treasury bonds out of the \$70,000,000 due in December. He had already stated how he proposed to deal with the remaining \$50,000,000.

The new recommendations of the chancellor of the exchequer were dismissed in a few words. Mr. Chamberlain regretted he was unable to relieve the income taxpayer as the cost of reducing the tax by 2 cents would be \$11,100,000 and he had not the necessary money. He proposed to take off July 1 the extra duty of 4 cents per pound put on tea last year which would absorb \$7,750,000, to clear away the remainder of the customs warehousing charges which were an annoyance to traders without materially increasing the revenue and to abolish certain small without materially increasing the revenue and to abolish certain small stamp duties, leaving \$2,110,000 to meet
