

CITY COUNCIL DOINGS

The Gravity Sewer Contract Confirmed at Last Night's Meeting.

THOSE "REVISED" COMMITTEES.

Land and Water Commissioners Pending. Submits Plans for a Sheep Route Over the Mountain.

The City Council held an adjourned session last night. The members present were: Rice, England, Hardy, Karrick, Moran, Barn, Bell, Evans, Simonds, Kelly, Boardman, Westland, Heiss, Lawson. President Lenthorn now occupied the chair and handed in an amendment of standing committee as revised by him. The list, however, was kept from the reporter with instruction that the recorder retain possession of it until Tuesday night.

In presenting the list President Lenthorn said: "I have been urged by certain members of the Council to reorganize the standing committees, and this appeared to be necessary in some of the committees. But when I began to remodel them I found that a change in one necessitated a change in others. At the last meeting I handed the recorder the new list. I got it again this morning to look over and have made certain changes in it, and will hand it to the recorder again this evening with the committees arranged as I think they should be. I desire that the members shall examine it by next Tuesday evening as I want it satisfactory. I have made the most important committees consist of five members, in order that all precincts can be represented."

KINNEY'S COPPER PLANT ADDITION.

The city engineer reported that plans of Kinney's copper plant subdivision had been filed in his office and he asked for instructions regarding the approval of the same. The engineer was authorized to approve the plans.

HIGHWAY ESTIMATES.

The city engineer reported that the estimated cost of constructing a six-foot cement sidewalk on the east side of Second East street from Fourth to Fifth streets in district No. 22 is \$1,000.

AUGUSTIN'S PREPOSITION.

City engineer reported that the cost of paving and curbing in paving districts Nos. 6, 7, 8 and 9 would be:

Market street, district No. 6, \$1,000; Main street, between West Temple and South Temple, \$1,000; Franklin Avenue, between South Temple and First Street, \$1,000; Franklin Avenue, between First and Second Streets, \$1,000; Second Street, between First and Second Streets, \$1,000; South Temple, between First and Second Streets, \$1,000; South Temple, between Second and Third Streets, from Second Street to First Street, \$1,000; South Temple from First Street to First Street, \$1,000; West Temple from First Street to First Street, \$1,000.

Estimated cost of paving and curbing on streets until May 23.

The city engineer reported that the cost of constructing a six-foot cement sidewalk on the north side of Third Street, from Fourth East to Ninth East would be \$4,000, or \$1.00 per foot. Referred to committee on streets.

MONEY FOR THE U. S.

City Auditor Haydock sent in a communication in which he recommended that an appropriation of \$12,125 be made to meet the second and third payments on the land purchased in the head of City Creek canyon from the Union Pacific. Adopted.

ACCESSION ROADWAY.

Land and Water Commissioner Peniston reported that in the matter of the petition of the Utah Pressed Brick and Tile Company, proposing to lay out a road from the rear of their lot, the lease should be so drawn that the water and roadway passing through be kept accessible to the city. Land on the table temporarily.

AUDITOR'S REPORT.

The city auditor's report for the month of April, as published in the News some days ago, was read and referred to the committee on finance.

POLICE JUSTICE'S REPORT.

The report of Police Justice Gee for the month of April was read and referred to the committee on police.

STREET CROSS-WALKS.

The board of public works sent in a communication asking for instructions relative to cross-walks over the portion of streets to be paved by the street railway, the Council having previously instructed them to allow to go only from the curb to the edge of the sidewalk through the median blocks, dislodged back to the board with power to act.

GRAVITY SEWER CONTRACT.

The board of public works reported that they had entered into a contract with the Foothill Construction Co. for laying bituminous or asphaltic rock sidewalk pavements on both sides of State street, between Fourth and Sixth South, and that a sufficient sum had been given in the sum of \$2000 to secure the payment in full in the time stipulated in the contract. Accompanying this report was a copy of the specifications, contract, bond and arbitration clauses.

The contract was approved and referred to the mayor.

PAVING RESOLUTION.

Moran introduced a resolution providing that the city engineer and

gravity outlet sewer of the construction concrete and brick masonry, about 11,400 feet long, and that they had executed a bond of \$10,000 to secure the proper performance of the work by the contractor. It was voted, 1st, that, with George M. Cannon, Francis Armstrong, John H. White and Wm. H. Howe as securities.

The contract covered several miles of closely graded material and required three years to be run, or four to seed. The action of the board was confirmed and the contract referred to the Mayor for his approval.

STREET ROAD.

A. J. Peniston reported that he was appointed by the mayor to set up a joint committee with members of the county court and Sheep Owners' Association to locate a route for sheep movement through the mountains leading to the waters of the creek. The country road is put in a bridge at this end and others are necessary or the trail should be enlarged to avoid crossing the creek. The latter would be a safety valve, while the trail away from the creek. This route avoids the Parry and Emigration waterworks, as it enters Parley's about seven miles above.

I would recommend that this work be completed soon, as the sheep needs more urgent and the matter needs immediate attention. Referred to the superintendent of waterworks and land and water commissioners.

FREE WATER.

The city engineer stated that he believed it would be an advantage to the city in the work of constructing the gravity sewer to have it undertaken by contractors for this work could save water from the plus effect of such men's recommendation that the contractor pass a resolution authorizing the same that it may be understood in future bids are received. The communication bore date of April 20th. Referred to committee on waterworks.

WANTS TO GET HIM.

Superintendent of Waterworks Ryan sent in a communication in which he announced that Mountaineer Pioneers J. C. Clark had reported to him that Clark and his wife intended to buy a house in City Creek canyon, and that he will build a house there unless prevented from doing so that the city has purchased considerable property in that vicinity.

He wants to have water supply from Parley's and he suggested that the city serve an injunction on Mr. Anderson without delay. City engineer and watermaster.

JACKSON'S ITEM.

In the matter of the petition of J. E. Jensen relating to a claim being constructed across City Creek which he claimed endangered his property, the city engineer reported that the city engineer reported that the dam was in a very dangerous position, proposed to be brought down, and it was necessary to protect petitioner's interests by a state wall, as asked for. Adopted.

FIFTH SANITARY IMPROVEMENT.

The committee on sanitary rules and quarantine regulations reported recommending that five sanitary inspectors from each precinct be appointed to serve at the pleasure of the Council at a salary of \$8 per day be appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the Council, with authority to enter private property and to make such inspection as may be necessary.
