THIS STYLE HAS A MOST UNIQUE COAT IDEA.

This illustration depicts one of the most attractive models among the fall arrivals. It has some extremely unique and attractive ideas. It is made in a combination of two shades of one color and also two cloth fabrics of about equal weight. Two tones of blue just a shade apart, each of them quite dark and containing a good deal of black are the chosen colors; the fabrics are a broadcloth for the lighter tone and a silk sateen for the darker. The skirt, which is demi-trained, is of the sashine with a deep hem cut in a pattern at the top, this is the lighter blue broadcloth. There are plaque shaped pieces of the cloth applied to carry out the trimming design. The coat has a pleated flounce of the broadcloth with a pleated costilline also of the cloth. There is a belt of white moire set with dark blue velvet buttons and collar and cuff facing also of the moire. More of the tiny velvet buttons outline the vest and two large buttons down the belt is back. The body portion of this coat is cut in a pattern that extends out over the sleeve and is heavily outlined in stitching. Stitching in a design also appears on the broadcloth skirt trimming. The large hat is of the two shades of blue also the bell being the darker shade and the silk trimming the lighter. A fancy feather matching the trimming in shade decorates the left side.
