President John Taylor broke no law of the land. He lived within the law. His plural marriages were contracted before the Act of 1862, the first Congressional law on the subject was enacted. He conformed to the law of 1882 and therefore was not legally amenable to its penalties. He was pursued in the same spirit as that which murdered Joseph and Hyrum. The forms of law perverted to excuse his persecutors, were a prostitution of the law for the injury of the innocent. The plain and evident meaning and intent of the antipolygamy laws have been ignored in the administration of the law as regards the "Mormons," and unprecedented, warped and contradictory rulings have been substituted. This, too, in the spirit of vindictiveness and hatred on the part of the law's representatives who, from, bench and bar, with trembling anger white-lipped passion have and abused, insulted and libelled the helpless victims of their unlawful fury.

The "retributive fate" which must overtake the workers of iniquity, will come to the wretches who have thus wreaked vengeance upon the servants of God, going outside of the provisions of law to gratify their malice and their spite.
