

### BERLIN LETTER.

BISMARCK, May 2.—The first prom-  
inent result of May-day agitation  
has been a firmament among  
among the manufacturers, merchants,  
mining owners and others em-  
ploying large numbers of hands to  
prosecute the formation of a German  
union against England. The origin  
of this union lies in the communications  
that passed between the Merchants'  
and Manufacture's Association  
here, and kindred organizations in  
other places regarding the May-day  
agitation. At a time when the

tions. The declared aim of  
the scheme is to effect a coalition
