This is the first machine plant to be installed in northern Utah, and the re-sult is watched with interest by the sheep men. Last year Mr. Peery's ellp averaged six pounds. This year the clip averaged six and three-quarter pounds. The increase of three-fourths of a pound per head pays for the in-stallation of the plant.
