The question of the number of terms allowed one executive can enly come up fairly in the shape of a proposition to amend the countitation, in which all political parties can participate, fixing the length of time or the number of terms for which one person shall be eligible for the office of President, and until such amendment is adopted the people cannot be restricted in their choice by a resolution further than they are now restricted as to age, nationality, &c. It may happen, in the future history of the country, that to change the executive because he has been eight years in office will prove ununfortunate, if not disastrous. The unfortunate, if not disastrous. The idea that any man could elect himself President, or even nominate self President, or even nominate himself, is preposterous; it is a rereflection on the intelligence and patriotism of the people to suppose such a thing possible. Any man can destroy his chances for the office, but no one can force an election or nomination. I am not, nor have I ever been a candidate for re-nomination, and I would not the property of the property

But I was made to believe that the public good called me to make a sacrifice. Then, too, such a fire of personal abuse and slander hat been kept up for four years, not sith at adding the conscious performance, to the best of my understanding, of the duties of my position, though I admit, in the light of subsequent events, many times subject to fairer criticism than an endorsement from those who alone govern republics, was a gratification that it is only human to have appreciated. Now, for a third term, I do not want it any more than I did the first. I would not write nor utter one word to change the will of the people in expressing and having their choice.
