Catholic Bazar Closes.—The Catholic bazar closed Saturday evening, financial success, with a record of about 4,000 meals served since the opening. The attendance was all that could be desired, and the sale of Christmas goods and novelties from the booths was heavy.

To Dedicate New Edifice.—The Danish Lutherans will dedicate their new church at First avenue and E street next Sunday at 11 a. m., with President C. C. Kloth and Secretary L. Jensen of the Nebraska division of the church to lead in the ceremony. There are to be special services Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings.

But she had been on her way but four hours when a telegram was received bringing news of her death. Mrs. Freund only returned from Cincinnati a few days ago. Mrs. Oberdorfer visited in this city during the winter of 1906.

Women's Board of Missions.—At Sunday evening's meeting of the Women's Board of Missions at the Central Christian church, Mrs. Chas. Friend stated that the local society had grown from 17 members in 1897 to 45 at present, and was supporting a pupil in an East Indian seminary, as well as doing the general work of the organization. It was said that the board had put a steamer on the Congo river to carry missionaries, and that the board had been able to do so because the societies of that state contributed more than \$1,000 necessary to establish the service.

SCARLET FEVER SPREADING. Thirty-three cases reported to Board of Health last week.

Thirty-three cases of scarlet fever were reported to the city board of health last week. Most of the disease is among school children and some of them are being carried by the rapid spread of the contagion. There are now a total of 76 houses quarantined on account of scarlet fever. There were nine cases of typhoid fever, five cases of diphtheria, two cases of smallpox, one case of measles, one case of pneumonia and eight cases of chicken pox, also reported, making a total of 39 cases of contagious diseases this week. There are ten houses under quarantine on account of smallpox and two patients at the isolation hospital suffering from smallpox.

During the week there were 23 births reported, eight males and 15 females. For the same period there were 23 deaths, 14 males and 9 females. Two bodies were shipped here for burial.

SPECIAL SERVICES AT TABERNACLE

Elder E. C. Ashton Delivers Forceful Address on Gospel Principles.

ERRONEOUS IDEAS EXTANT.

In Renaissance to Follow Carnival of Commercialism, the Gospel Will Play Important Part.

There was a good attendance at the special service and recital held yesterday afternoon in the tabernacle, which was held at 3 o'clock. The musical numbers, by Prof. McClellan, consisted of the "Prelude" and "Siciliano" from "Cavalleria Rusticana," "Intermezzo" by Lemare, the old melody "I need thee every hour" and Handel's "Largo." The opening prayer was offered by Elder F. W. Osterstrom.

ELDER E. C. ASHTON.

The speaker was Elder E. C. Ashton, who was invited at the last minute to take the place of Elder W. H. King, who was prevented from being present through the death of a near friend. Elder Ashton's remarks were prefaced by reading several stanzas from the seventh chapter of Matthew, regarding the good tree bringing forth good fruit, etc., which was explained to be the manner in which every doctrine of Mormonism desired his religion to be judged.

The erroneous conclusions to be drawn from reports of Mormonism in southern encyclopedias was also referred to, the statement being made that Mormonism did not depend for its existence on their prayer books.

An explanation of the Book of Mormon was briefly given after which Elder Ashton referred to the wave of commercialism which has powerfully affected the inhabitants of the United States, and which, in the hands of scientific men, will surely be followed by an age of renaissance, not only in literature and learning but also in religion. Elder Ashton said that Mormonism endeavored to inform man where he came from, why he was here and where he was going. He said that Joseph, like the prophets of old, was moved by a foreteller of future events. He broke away from the old moorings and the errors of former centuries including the doctrine of eternal damnation, and the importance of grace and the fulfillment of works, and the teaching that the world was created from nothing. It was explained that this life, but a cycle of eternal progression, and that man may eventually become perfect as his Father in heaven is perfect.

ETERNAL HOPE.

The eternal hope held out by Mormonism was referred to, and it was said that all men who do not believe here are not to be eternally condemned. All men will be saved excepting a few, though they may not all be saved in the same glory, for as Paul said, there is one glory of the sun and another of the moon, and as one star differeth from another so is the resurrection.

The belief of the Latter-day Saints in new revelation was also explained. The prophet of the earth is not, as all God designs to reveal to man, and the Latter-day Saints believe that God will reveal many important truths to his children on the earth. In the days of Moses God designed to grant him personal interviews and instructions regarding the work he was to do. As God is no respecter of persons it is reasonable to suppose that he will yet reveal further truths to his children.

The statement of Joseph Quincy, that it may yet be said that Joseph Smith was the greatest American of the nineteenth century was read, after which reference was made to the practical work which is being done by Mormonism, especially in the care of the poor. It met the test of a true religion as laid down in "Simple Life."

In conclusion Elder Ashton said that Mormonism presents a firm basis for man's faith. He said in his devotion to a love for God and man and a desire to help others which indicates that it will play a prominent part in the renaissance which will follow the present carnival of commercialism.
