Adlai Speaks on the Issues of the Campaign.

RECEPTION TO CLEVELAND.

Suptor Hill Tells His Friends What He Thinks of MacVeagh.

THE COLORADO DEMOCRATS.

A Meeting at Elwood, Indiana.—No Reply Yet to Free—Money for Corrupt Law.

BROOKLYN, Oct. 25.—The Democracy of Brooklyn turned out in force tonight and held a mass meeting at the Academy of Music, where Adlai Stevenson the vice-presidential candidate, and Congressmen Hayes of Maryland spoke on the issues of the campaign to over 4,000 persons. Stevenson received an ovation as he stepped upon the stage. Stevenson said, in part:

At the close of President Cleveland's administration the surplus in the treasury, exclusive of the amount set aside for the payment of the national debt, was, I believe, numbered \$80,000,000. It is remembered that during the latter half of his administration, the important question was, "What shall we do with the surplus revenues?" In view of the fact that the expenditures of the government were then \$100,000,000 in excess of the expenditures, the question was one of interest to the American people. What is the attitude of congressmen who now control us of the surplus? Two years and a half of Republican administration! On a basis of the revenue of the government as estimated for the present fiscal year, and the liabilities of the government, of \$100,000,000, and the current appropriations for the same period, there will be a deficit of fifty-two million dollars, upon the assumption that the law requiring forty-eight million dollars for the surplus will stand. It is my opinion, and I trust it will stand, that the surplus will be used to meet the deficiency. There is no question that the bankruptcy which now threatens the treasury is the result, first of the McKinley tariff law, and secondly, the lavish appropriation of the Fifth-Century Clause.

The speaker asserted that the treasury had always found its most faithful guardians in the Democratic party. Taking up the financial plank of the platform, he said, "I have assumed it very fitly, and, in passing, to denounce the Democratic system of protection to certain industries by heavy tariffs; and the time is past when the right of the tax-hated people to speak freely to give their views on the force bill must be allowed in every line and paragraph broadcast direct of the people. 'This legislation,' said he, 'is devised in a spirit of hate.'

CLEVELAND AMONG BUFFALO FRIENDS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—The reception at the Imperial Hotel tonight given by ex-President Cleveland to his old Cleveland club was attended by about two hundred persons, consisting of members of the club and a few invited guests. Cleveland's arrival was the occasion of applause, and all those present remained standing until the speech of the evening was over. After a brief preliminary speech, calling the meeting to order, the guest of the evening was introduced as one whom friends called him, and when mentioned in his name, the audience responded with a hearty cheer.

Mr. Cleveland spoke in a pleasant vein about his early days in Buffalo, and his friends of that time whom he saw again among the members of his club. In the atmosphere of personal friendliness, in which the social session, he said, he heartily found that the organization has political aims and purposes. He was glad, however, when the plans and purposes required to be made, that they merely added to his appreciation of their personal kindness. He said:

Therefore, while my heart is full of gratitude to the friends I see about me, I cannot forbear the suggestion of my heart that your organization not only deserves our hearty support, but friendship for all good townsmen, but also indicates that you are fully alive to your duties as good citizens.

You know how devoted I am to the welfare of the public service, and to the welfare of our country, and to the welfare of our people. I hold fast to the doctrine that their government should at all times be administered for them, and that they should be induced to receive as their share of the burdens of the nation, so far as they maintain the small portion which may filter through to them in the course of making social benefits.

In this case, the Democratic party is holding open the house of legislation of the state that government by the people should be government for the people.

It is as needless as it is foreign to my

purposes to discuss in detail what is thought and intended as my interpretation of the differences between the several political parties, presented to our people in this campaign. I only desire to assure you that the gratifications were personal attachment to a greater number of my constituents and to the other candidates than to myself. The result of the support you give in an organized way to your old townsmen should create in your mind the best impression that the cause is in aid of progress, and that the cause of the people is the cause of the country.

Cleveland was followed by Lieutenant-Governor Sheehan, who spoke of the certainty of New York's going for the Democratic ticket.

Then Mayor Blimp of Buffalo made a few remarks, and the rest of the evening was spent in social conversation and handshaking.
