Twenty-six arguments are presented n behalf of appellants to restrain the farriman element from voting the Jaion Pacific holdings in the Southern Harriman Pacific election. Among these argu-ments are alegations that the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific roads being competitors, it was a violation of public policy and for that reason illegal for the Union Pacific to acquire and maintain control of the Southern Paclfic by purchasing and voting its stock; that discrimination has been practised in making expenditures on the Central Pacific in that twice as much money had been expended from the earnings of the Southern Pacific system on the 871 miles of the Central Pacific between Ogden and San Francisco as has been expended on the remaining \$,000 miles, and that the immediate purpose of such expenditures is to make the Southern Pacific line a direct through route from Chicago to San Francisco by way of Omaha and Ogden for the purpos making it the main competitor in transcontinental business of other transcon tinental lines; that the result would be to give the Union Pacific a haul over its entire line between Omaha and Ogden nd the Southern Pacific only the short haul between Ogden and San Francis

haul between Ogden and San Francisco instead of the long haul over its main line from New Orleans. The pleadings show that since the Union Pacific management has assumed control of the Southern Pacific the control of the Southern Pacific the system previously in vogue of keeping accounts of disbursements has been dis ntinued and that it is impossible to give figures accurately.
