

In Hansen Poisoning Fatality - Case Still Shronded in Mystery.

As has been stated the evidence indicated that the parties had always lived together happily, one witness only testifying that Mrs. Hansen had told her that Mr

that she was in any way responsible for the presence of the poison in the breakfust food. Yet the evidence seems clear that arsenic was found in the cooked food, and not in any of the original articles from which it was prepared. Mr. Hansen was questioned very closely as to his acts in connection with the unfortunate affair. For the most part his testimony was clear and con-cise. On his return from the store on the morning of the poisoning he had disposed of the poisoned food, and stated that he had told his sister about it, this statement she did not recall but stated that it was probable that he

had bought rough on rats to kill mice at the store and had given it to a
