

Berlin, 19.—Numerous Hollanders residing in the Prussian district of Emsen, on the Dutch frontier, who have recently reached military age, have been notified that they must become Prussian subjects or leave the country within six weeks.

Strasbourg, 19.—The telegraph office destroyed the telephone department.

St. Petersburg, 19.—Admiral Baldwin of the United States Navy, gave a grand ball on board his flagship *Albatross*, on Monday evening. There was a brilliant company, including all the foreign ambassadors at St. Petersburg, as well as Washington, special representative of the United States at the coronation, Van Natta, Papal Nuncio at Vienna, who represented the Pope, Daggers, Russian Foreign Minister, and Vice Admiral Chestakov of the Russian Navy.

London, 19.—The publication of documents relative to Ireland, causing some difference in the Curia. A committee is appointed, which will examine Irish questions.

London, 19.—The Chamber of Deputies to-day, several members expressed regret that the United States Government had unduly taxed objects of art imported into the United States, they demanded reprisals. Magagnoli, Minister of Finance, and Delelo, Minister of Public Instruction, while they blamed the action of the United States Congress in imposing a tax on imported objects of art, yet hoped that diplomatic negotiations would procure better results. They added that reprisals would be useless, especially because of the impossibility of fixing a real value on objects of art. A motion was ultimately adopted requesting the government to introduce a bill of inquiry into the question.

London, 20.—The Prince of Wales yesterday read a paper, written by the Duke of Edinburgh before the series conference, which contained the statement that, in view of the diminution of the fish supply in the North Sea, the example of the American government, which donated a million annually for breeding sea-fish, was well worthy of imitation by European Powers.

London, 20.—In the House of Commons this afternoon, the bill providing for the application of £2,000 of the Church surplus fund to the Irish Sea fisheries, and particularly to provide harbors, passed its second reading.

Durant & Co., general merchants, failed. Liabilities £100,000.

London, 10.—A dispatch from London, who represents the interests of the Irish National League in Australia, states that he would entree to send from that country £50 for the Parnell fund.

Berlin, 20.—The arrest of the author Krazenski, and other persons charged with giving information to Russian revolutionists regarding the movements of Russian troops will lead to their trial on a charge of high treason. Important evidence is obtained against them. The editor named Adler has been arrested to the German Ambassador in Vienna important papers bearing on the case, which have been forwarded to Prince Bismarck.

Berlin, 20.—The Right Rev. Jno. Adam Colenso, D. D., Bishop of Natal, is dead.

Amsterdam, 20.—An extensive fire has prevailed in the royal dock here. The man-of-war *Dogger* is destroyed, and the man-of-war *Koatener* considerably damaged. Loss between three and four million florins.

Amsterdam, 20.—The origin of the fire unknown. One man was killed while trying to extinguish the flames, and three others injured.

CRISTIANA, 21.—The Storting decided by a vote of 80 to 32, the royal decree to increase the allowance of the Crown Prince to 50,000 kroner. The reason given by the opponents of the measure is the unsatisfactory political situation.

Amsterdam, 21.—The floods in Silesia attended by waterspouts. A part of the town of Hirschberg submerged and the houses of adjacent villages are flooded. The railroad near Salzburg is washed away, a number of cattle have perished. Dispatches from Breslau state that during the last 24 hours the Danube river Weiss at the town of Regensburg has been most alarming; water having reached the high mark since 1830. The Evangelical school and church, two barracks, part of the postoffice are submerged. Disastrous floods are also expected in Bohemia and Moravia. Danube is expected to overflow shortly, as the river June

and mountain streams are rising rapidly. The quay at Linz is flooded.

The pardoning power is exercised with great prodigality by the Emperor William of Germany. Of six hundred and forty-six criminals condemned to death between the years 1864 and 1878, only twenty-six were executed, and only three have been put to the ax since 1881.

The famous lighthouse at South Bernera, one of the Hebrides, is visited twice a year only by the supply-ship and once a year by a clergyman. The lighthouse stands 700 feet above the sea, on a crag. It is very difficult for even a lifeboat to land. There are about twenty people on the island, mainly subsisting on fish, wild fowl and eggs.

A religious exchange says: "A village in Connecticut, with a population of 800, has six churches of different denominations, each in competitive rivalry with the others. This is by no means an isolated case. In many places in the New England States it is almost as bad, and there are scores of places in the newly settled parts of the West where similar folly prevails."
